MRS. W. H. WHEELER DIES

FORMER EUGENE RESIDENT

SCUMPS TO PARALYSIS

Mrs. William H. Wheeler, wife of the editor and publisher of the Enterprise at Halsey, and formerly of this city, where she was well known, died at her home at Halsey yesterday evening at six o'clock from paralysis.

Mrs. Wheeler was born in New York 61 years ago, and lived in that city, Washington, D. C., Chicago and San Francisco nearly all her life. She saw her father, mother, only brother, only sister and first husband die of tuberculosis, the latter in California, where she had taken him in the hope that the climate might help him. She lost all her possessions in the San Francisco earthquake and fire and went to Portland soon afterward.

In 1909 she married William H.

Wheeler and in 1912 they came to Eugene, residing here seven years. Since then they have lived in Brownsville and Halsey.

December 11, 1921, she became paralyzed on one side, but her condition improved until she was caring for her home without help and doing some typewriting. A second stroke came Monday, March 26, about 10 A. M. Before night she lapsed into unconsciousness, which continued to the end.

Mrs. Wheeler's vivacity, cheerfulness and kindness endeared her to many friends wherever she went. She leaves no known kin.

ED. L. AYRES PASSES

PROMINENT FARMER SU-
CCUMBS TO PNEUMONIA

Junction City Man Was Promi-
nent in Different Agri-
cultural Activities

Edward L. Ayres, one of the most prominent farmers of Lane county, died at his home near Junction City yesterday morning after an illness of three weeks' duration from pneumonia. He was aged 52 years.

Mr. Ayres was a member of one of the best known pioneer families of the county and had succeeded much better than the average person who takes up the tilling of the soil as a livelihood. He was a member of the board of directors of the Eugene Fruit Growers' association, a prominent worker in the orange and apple in other lines. He was a public spirited citizen and was foremost in all things that tended to uplift the farmer and for the good of his community and the county at large.

Mr. Ayres is survived by his mother, Mrs. Mary E. Ayres, his widow, three sons, Elmer Ayres, at the state college at Corvallis; Chester and Wallace Ayres, at home, and a daughter, Lucile, at home, besides his brother, William A. Ayres, secretary of the Lane County Fair association. He also leaves two sisters.

The funeral will be held at the Veatch chapel Thursday morning at 10 o'clock with interment in the Gillespie cemetery north of Eugene. Rev. Mosher of the Junction City Baptist church, will conduct the service.

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DIMM SAYS FORCE USED

FORMER EUGENE MAN LAYS
BLAME ON TO OTHERS

Claims that he had been forced into the counterfeiting business under threats of death were made before United States Commissioner Frazer by Paul Dimm, Portland man formerly of Eugene, and former member of a Portland printing firm. Dimm appeared as a witness at the hearing of James Duffy, alias Murphy, another member of the ring.

"I was broke—financially embarrassed," Dimm told the commissioner. "I didn't want to do it, but these fellows kept after me to make drawings of travelers' checks. When I said I wouldn't, they told me that they'd take me bodily to Portland and give me a good funeral here."

Duffy was ordered held for action by federal authorities at Seattle and Frank Cole, another member of the gang caught here, was

later ordered removed to San Francisco to stand trial there.

SNOW IS DISAPPEARING

WORK SOON TO START ON UPPER MCKENZIE HIGHWAY
