OIL INDICATIONS FOUND

DRILLERS PREPARE TO OPERATE AT COTTAGE GROVE

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., March 29.—It is probable that drilling for oil in this section will start within the very near future. G. W. McFarland and Almond Hemmaway, who were recently engaged by Sage and Olson, of San Francisco, oil operators, have signed up nearly 10,000 acres of land upon which drilling operations will be permitted. The oil operators agree that within a year from the receipt of the leases upon this amount of land they will commence drilling for the fluid.

Mr. Olson, a member of the firm, who formerly was pastor of the Christian church of this city and came here to again fill the pulpit, made a superficial examination of the country and declared that there was no doubt that oil would be found here. Indications of oil were found a number of years ago when an artesian well was sunk by the Cottage Grove Electric company.

DAILY MARKET REPORT

OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE
PORTLAND, Ore., March 29.—There is a fully steady tone indicated for eggs in the local territory, despite efforts on the part of some of the f. o. b. buyers to "kid" themselves into believing that the market is lower and thereby deceive competitors.

There is no weakness at all indicated in either the buying or selling price for eggs, according to leading operators. Purchases of current receipts of mixed color standards continue generally at 21¢, but 22¢ is reported in isolated instances. For henneries purchases are firm at 24¢ generally, although as high as 25¢ is being paid.

Cold storage operations continue the dominating factor in the trade at this time. This movement is taking care of practically all the first grade offerings. Sales on the open market generally consist of candied stock that is not good enough for storage but perfect for everyday use.

TEMPORARY SHORTAGE BUTTER.—There is a temporary shortage of butter in the local trade at the moment with cubes and prints firm but at unchanged prices. A weaker Southern California price is a contributing factor for awhile at primary points.

CHEESE FIGHT IS CONTINUING.—Fight for control of the trade in Tillamook cheese here is still waging, resulting in loss to all participants. Indications point to a steady market for awhile at primary points.

VEAL MARKET IS WEAK AGAIN.—With very liberal offerings, the market for country killed calves is weaker and generally lower. For tops the general market is around 16¢ as an extreme. Hogs active, steady, although some reported weakness. Spring lambs are selling well.

ONION TRADE IS MARKING TIME.—Because of the unwillingness of growers to accept prevailing prices, there is a lull of activity in the market for onions at this time. Resales are impossible at a profit beyond the value now quoted.

APPLE SELLING STILL FORCED.—Selling of apples is still being forced here with very liberal stocks of ordinary to poor quality. Real extra fancy goods show a scarcity. For extra offerings the demand is moderate.
