BETTER SIRES WANTED

Pure-bred Bulls Will Be Brought Into Lane County This Year

The Lane County Holstein-Friesian association will assist in carrying on the nation-wide advertising campaign inaugurated some time ago by the national association. Plans are also under way to bring into the county a number of pure-bred bulls and a number of sires of interest to breeders of Holstein-Friesian cattle in the county were discussed at a meeting of the Lane County Holstein-Friesian association at the chambers of commerce yesterday afternoon. The meeting was held at 1:30 o'clock.

Field Agent Here

E. W. Meyer, field agent of the national association for Oregon, Washington and Idaho, was in attendance and gave the members of the local association information regarding the work of carrying on

an advertising campaign. The local association will make liberal use of newspaper space and bill boards, it is announced.

More pure-bred sires will be brought into the county this summer than ever before, according to plans laid yesterday. There are already quite a number of bulls of noted lineage among the herds of Lane county. It is planned to eliminate every grade bull in this section of the state and place the breeding of this type of dairy herd on strictly a pure-bred basis.

Exhibits to Be Better

Plans were also discussed at this meeting to make bigger and better exhibits at the county fair, the state fair and the Pacific International Livestock exposition this year than ever before. Lane county Holstein cattle have always made a good showing at outside fairs and expositions.

T. J. Sweeney, of Goshen, was named at this meeting as chairman of a committee on exhibits. Max Arp is chairman of the committee on the better sire campaign and O. L. Dunlap will head the committee on advertising. C. B. Swanson, of Coburg, will have charge of calf club work.

The attendance yesterday was larger than usual. The members say that Mr. Meyer always draws a good crowd of Holstein breeders as he invariably has something of more than ordinary interest to tell them.

TWENTY-GALLON STILL

FOUND ON JENSEN FARM

Outfit Is Best Ever Taken in County, Say Officers

7 BARRELS MASH READY

Sand and Charcoal Purifier Used in "Moonshine" Process—Key of Grog in Owner's Car

What is said by prohibition officers, Van Svarverud and Rodney Roach, to be the most complete distilling outfit ever uncovered in Lane county was captured together with several gallons of "moon" in a raid on the Elmer Jensen farm near the Bethel school house last night. Jensen, and Archie Wasson, who was with him, were brought in and lodged in jail. Jensen on a charge of manufacturing intoxicating liquor, and Wasson for investigation.

Deputies Svarverud and Roach said they were riding along the old Pacific road about 8 o'clock last night when they came upon a car parked without lights near the Bethel school house, and observed two men in a fence corner. They stopped to investigate, and upon searching the car, found a five-gallon keg full of moonshine. While the investigation was in progress, Jensen jumped into his car and drove away. Deputy Svarverud pursued him in the county's car, and Jensen turned in at the next farm. Here he took out across the field and escaped.

Mash Found in Home

The officers then drove to the Jensen home, and were admitted by Mrs. Jensen. Upon searching the house they found seven barrels of mash upstairs, but the still and coil had been removed. Jensen appeared at home later and submitted to arrest. He refused to divulge the hiding place of his apparatus at first, but later led the deputies out to his orchard, where the complete outfit was found.

The still, of twenty gallons capacity, is ingeniously made of copper, and is capable of producing five gallons of liquor a day. The outfit is the first to be found in the county that is equipped with a purifier, according to the officers. A large crock, containing charcoal and sand was used for this purpose.

The complete outfit, with five gallons of liquor, and a generous sample of mash, was brought to town by the officers. The still and coil were skillfully constructed, said the deputies, and with the use of the purifier, a very high quality of liquor was turned out.

Wasson who is held in jail for investigation, has appeared in court before on similar charges.

"This had nothing to do with my resignation," said Mr. Carleton. "I never heard of any such opposition and I am quite sure there was none among the board members. I was very much surprised at such a story."

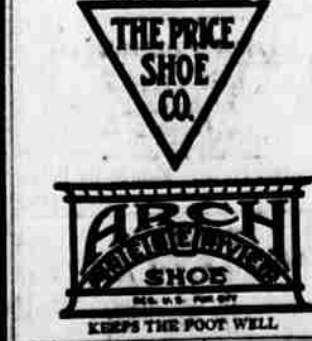
Members of the school board declared that there had never been any protest against Mr. Carleton on the part of the patrons of the schools and as far as the board was concerned the members were

MANY FINES ARE PAID

BROWN HANSARD FIGURES HE HAS GIVEN \$2850

Brown Hansard, of Lebanon, who was sent to the Oregon state insane asylum, told Sheriff Dunlap of Linn county that while in jail with nothing else to do he had figured up the fines that he has paid into the treasury of Linn county. The total, according to

Hansard's figures, is \$2850, largely paid on liquor charges.

At Hansard's hearing before the county court in Albany, he divulged the fact that he had intended to erect a hotel at Cottage Grove. Prior to the trial he had told the officials, they say, that he planned to build the hotel for \$15,000, convince a loan association that it was worth \$15,000, borrow \$40,000 and then let the company take over the building.—Herald.

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
