OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE
PORTLAND, Ore., March 30.—All through storage interests would be quite willing to lower their bids for eggs because their local house needs, the position of the trade remains uniformly good.

Hides for mixed color standards remain around 21¢ generally for current offerings, although as high as 22¢ is being paid for best grades. Hides continue at 24¢ generally and occasional lots in a small way as high as 25¢.

back for buying. Demand for eggs from other centers is keen and this is what is keeping the price high here. Receipts are enormous but there is a very huge call which is taking care of all offerings.

The storage movement, while still young, is one of the greatest known in the trade here.

BUTTER SITUATION IS HELD
Market for butter continues to reflect strength here with a greater demand than supply at current values. The output of butter has not increased of late, although a gain is due within the next week or so.

POULTRY MARKET RULERS EASY
With the passing of the big Easter demand the market for poultry is showing a generally easier tone along the street. Considerable stock was held over during the day, especially light hens.

MEAT SITUATION UNCHANGED
Unchanged prices and tone are shown in the market for country-killed meats. Veal are selling fair around 15¢/15¢ for tops, hogs are moving around 12¢/12¢ while spring lamb range from 22¢ to 24¢ generally for pelted stock.

ASPARAGUS SUPPLY IS SHORT
Supply of asparagus was rather short during the day, although sales were made at lower prices, 18¢/18¢ generally for best green. This is due to the lack of sufficient buyers in the South.

HONEY DEMAND IS VERY SLOW
While the trade is still asking full value there is very slow demand for honey at the time. The public is not purchasing much honey at the former advance in price.
