State Association Holds Meeting at University

CHADWICK IS HONORED

Work of Chamber Service Department Described by M. J. Duryea; Development Discussed

L. Antles, secretary of the Bend chamber of commerce, was unanimously elected president of the Oregon association of commercial secretaries at the annual meeting held at the university last night. Lynn Rubin, of Grants Pass, was chosen vice president. Barney Garrett, of Oregon City, a graduate of the university in 1921, was elected secretary, and J. W. Brewer, secretary of the Oregon state chamber of commerce, was elected president of the association.

Resolutions were adopted favoring the endorsement of investigation of a central marketing bureau for farm products to be handled by chambers of commerce; the dividing of the state into sections for the purpose of meetings of chamber secretaries; the sponsoring of endowment campaigns for educational institutions similar to the University of Oregon, and the recommending to the state highway commission that they furnish road maps for tourists.

Thanks were also expressed at this time to Dean E. C. Robbins, of the school of business administration of the university for his cooperation in the short course, and to others connected with the university who helped to make the session a success.

Industrial Survey Discussed
The matter of a state industrial survey was also discussed at this time, and steps will be taken in the near future to work out a survey which will cover all industries of Oregon in as nearly comprehensive manner as possible.

During the session in the afternoon, M. J. Duryea, head of the service department of the state chamber of commerce, outlined the scope of the department's work. He told of assisting several chambers in various parts of the state in conducting successful membership campaigns. During the term of his office he delivered 68 lectures in 58

cities in Oregon, besides several informal talks. An information bureau for the purpose of aiding local chambers has also been built up, stated Mr. Duryea.

Co-operation Is Asked
In closing his report, Mr. Duryea asked for close co-operation of all chambers of commerce. "Unity of purpose will enable the whole state to progress as it should," was his concluding statement.

Irving E. Vinling, of Ashland, a member of the board of directors of the state chamber, told of the work of the state organization, and discussed the aims and plans for the future.

"The state chamber must stand upon its own feet, as a live, able organization," he said, "but to do this we must have the wholehearted support of the entire state."

Broad Outlook Asked
Mr. Vinling urged a broad outlook on the present problems, and declared that the problem is not merely a community or state problem, but one of national importance.

In the discussion following the secretaries present expressed themselves as willing to back the state chamber to the limit of their ability.

An intensive development program for the entire state, with a view to solving the problems of marketing and land settlement, was the topic of J. W. Brewer, general secretary of the Oregon state chamber of commerce at the fourth secretaries' session at the university yesterday morning. This program includes the raising of \$200,000 for state-wide development, said Mr. Brewer. This fund will be subscribed entirely by Portland business men, it was stated, during a campaign that is scheduled to start in the near future.

"The first thing to do, and the first thing that will be done," said Mr. Brewer, "will be to sell Oregon to Oregon people. Every Oregonian must believe that Oregon is ready for an era of expansion, and then it will be easy to spread the doctrine to other states."

Many Unfilled Acres
"In the Willamette valley there are five million tillable acres, yet in the whole state, only 100,000 acres are actually in cultivation. Many of these acres could be more intensively cultivated to the advantage of both the state and owners."

Publicity, both state and national, is to play a large part in the development program, said Mr. Brewer, and it was stated that further details of this branch of work were yet to be worked out. The inflated values of land in Oregon were held to be a condition that must be overcome before the state can progress, said Mr. Brewer. "Land must be valued not by the bushels of grain or the tons of fruit it produces," he stated, "but by the actual return its brings in dollars and cents. Land speculation has been over-indulged in Oregon, and must stop. The home seeker must be offered land at a price which will enable him to receive a fair return on his investment, and he must also be given liberal terms with which to pay for this property."

Work Is Explained
In speaking of the work of the state chamber of commerce, Mr. Brewer stated that the body acted as a clearing house for commercial associations of the entire state, yet it functioned actively and independently as a separate body. It is the duty of the state body, he said, to attempt to systematize the different development projects and form them into a definite program.

In dealing with the need of the farmer now on the farm, Mr. Brewer held that specialization was an immediate necessity. "Smaller farms, more intensively cultivated will go far towards solving the present financial problem of the producer," he said.

A firm belief in Oregon, and a spirit of optimism were declared to be prime essentials to both development and prosperity. "Believe in your state," said Mr. Brewer in conclusion, "and be not only an optimist, but a 'peptomist,' a man who not only believes that Oregon is bound to go ahead by leaps and bounds, but one who is willing to take off his coat and work with this view."

Problem Is National
Presenting the agricultural problem as national as well as state-wide, George A. Mansfield, state president of the Farm Bureau, said that not only must the farmer organize but that business men must organize with the farmers.

"Only 28 per cent of the world's population is engaged in the work of providing supplies for all, yet this 28 per cent received but 17.4 per cent of the national income," said Mr. Mansfield.

"When the farmer has money he spends it, not only for necessities, but for luxuries of life," he was pointed out, "and when the farmer spends money, every channel of trade benefits. Thus it is up to commercial men to help solve the farmer's problem, and in this way bring more money to his business."

Potato Loss Is Example
As one item showing the problem facing the farmer, Mr. Mansfield cited potatoes, which he said, are marketed at present at an actual loss of 50 cents a bushel.

"Yet these potatoes which bring the farmer as low as 60 cents a bushel on his farm, are sold in restaurants, after a little preparation, for a price that is equal to \$70 a bushel. An increase of a few cents a bushel to the farmer would make but little difference to the consumer, yet it would mean the difference between profit and loss to the farmer. And if the farmer could make money he would spend money, the business would then prosper, and everyone would be benefited."

Meetings End Tonight
The meetings will end this evening with a banquet for the secretaries given by the Kiwanis and Rotary clubs of Eugene in honor of the visitors.

The morning session will open this morning with a presentation of "Tourists and Travel," by W. D. Dodson, and Professor A. L. Lomax, of the university, will speak on "Relations of Inland Towns to Foreign Trade." Herbert Cuthbert, secretary of the Pacific Northwest Tourist association, will discuss "State Publicity and Tourist Travel."

The afternoon session will be devoted to a discussion on "Mistakes of the Past Year," led by H. O. Frobach, president during the past year of the state association of secretaries.

FOREST FIRE REPORTED

BLAZE COVERS FIVE OR SIX ACRES IN HEBBO DISTRICT

The first fire of the season on the Shuswap national forest was reported to Ralph R. Shelley, supervisor of this forest, yesterday from the Hebo district in Tillamook county. Last week during the period a rancher's slashing fire spread to forest land and covered five or six acres, damaging quite a number of young trees and killing considerable brush, according to the report received by the supervisor.

Supervisor Shelley said that this is rather early to be receiving reports of forest fires but fires have occurred on this forest as early as the fore part of January, according to the records, he said.

A. S. DUDLEY IS SPEAKER

PULL TOGETHER FOR TOWN, SAYS SACRAMENTO MAN

In Address at Chamber of Commerce Luncheon California Booster Gives Advice

"Get together and pull for your town and community. Do not criticize and condemn others until you have done something for your town yourself," said A. S. Dudley, secretary of the Sacramento, Cal., chamber of commerce at the weekly luncheon of the Eugene chamber yesterday noon.

Mr. Dudley said that no citizen takes a real interest in his town until he has done something for it. He said that many citizens think there are enough people working for the town and they will have nothing to do. "If you all have this idea you cannot expect your town to be anything," said the speaker. "The chamber of commerce is the organization to sell your town. It is necessary for everyone to work to put the town in a stable condition."

POWER PLANT BID ASKED

WORK WILL START SOON ON MUNICIPAL PROJECT

Bids for the proposed improvement to the canal and tail-race of the municipal power plant at Waverlyville will be advertised for at once and will be opened on April 30, according to action taken at a special meeting of the water board last night. The canal will be widened and deepened for a distance of approximately four miles and the tail-race will be improved for about one-half mile. It is estimated that the project will involve an expenditure of approximately \$75,000.

It is expected that the project will require about eight months to complete and it is hoped by the members of the water board that work will be started as soon as possible in order to have the plant in readiness for the installation of additional machinery before the end of the year, according to C. A. McClain, superintendent of public utilities.

COOKY JAR TO BE FILLED

LEGION AUXILIARY TO FURNISH SWEETS TO BUDDIES

Next week is the time set for the Eugene auxiliary to the American Legion to fill the cookie jars for the disabled veterans of the World war in Portland. The auxiliary has been asked to furnish 200 dozen of the cookies and the members are asking the people to help them meet their quota.

There are from 120 to 200 disabled buddies in the work and time and it is the plan of the auxiliaries over the state never to allow the cookie jar to get empty. The people of Eugene are asked to take their cookies to the chamber of commerce beginning Saturday, April 14, and continue throughout the next week.

FAR WEST TO BE TOPIC

KIVANISANS TO HEAR OF PROPOSED LOCAL INDUSTRY

Members of the Eugene Kiwanis club will have a special far west meeting at the luncheon session of the organization to be held next Monday noon at the Osburn hotel. Details concerning the plan of bringing the Albany plant of the Far West Manufacturing company to establish in this city will be taken up for discussion after speakers have explained the value of the industry as an additional advantage to the progress of the community.

Several members of the Kiwanis club who have personally investigated the possibilities of the proposition on the speaking program and it is hoped to arouse considerable interest in the stock sale of the concern now in progress.

AIRPLANES ARE WANTED

FOREST PATROL IS REQUESTED BY STATE
