Mrs. Heckart to Build Residence—Mrs. W. O. Heckart yesterday took out a permit to remodel the garage on her residence lot at 1034 Mill street into a residence by adding to it. The estimated cost of the work, according to the permit, is \$1500.

Musical Recital in Planned—One of the largest formal musical affairs of the present season at the University of Oregon will be held Tuesday evening at the presentation of a program by Jane Thacher of the U. of O. school of music. Pauline Miller Chapman, of Portland, vocalist, will also be on the

program. The affair will be held at the woman's building on the campus and several hundred invitations have been extended.

Warehouse Is Entered—The Grangers' Eugene warehouse at 440 Charnell street was entered some time tonight before last but nothing of value was missed, according to a report to the police.

Mill Capacity to Increase—D. C. Evans, of the firm of Evans and Burgess, sawmill operators of the No. 1 district, was a visitor here yesterday. Evans says that the daily capacity of the plant is soon to be increased from about 20,000 feet to 25,000.

Leave for Portland—E. C. Simmonds, local representative of the Ford Motor company, has left for Portland in company with John Marshall and Frank Hart, members of the local agency staff. They will inspect the recently opened Ford assembly plant at Portland.

Matt Cholla Released—Matt Cholla, who had been in the county jail for several months for having liquor in his possession, was released yesterday. He paid the county \$18, which was all the money he could raise, having served most of a \$250 fine and his 30 days' jail sentence.

Deer Heads Sent to Colonel Lender—Two stuffed and mounted deer heads which were left here by Colonel John Lender when he departed for his former home in England are to be shipped to him, according to E. C. Eckert, taxidermist of this city, who has mounted the trophies. They are being sent to Portland and friends in that city will forward them to England.

Baseball Boosters to Plan—Carl G. Washburne, of A. J. Romeus of this city, who have been named as a committee to boost for a delegation from Eugene to attend the opening Coast league baseball game at Portland April 11, will soon make plans to interest other baseball fans in the proposed trip. The local committee was named by Governor Pierce who has also proclaimed a state-wide half-holiday for the event.

Road Work Soon to Start—The work of macadamizing the seven-mile highway between the Coburg bridge and the county line will soon be under way, according to residents of that district who were here yesterday. It is expected that the road will be torn up for operations in half-mile sections in order that traffic will be interfered with as little as possible, according to Elvin Taylor, resident of that district here yesterday.

Work of Remodeling Building Starts—Work has started on the remodeling of the building on Willamette street, formerly used as the Oregon hospital. The plans for the building provide for 10 modern apartments and the installation of an oil burning heating system is also included in the arrangements for the apartment house. It is not expected that the building will be ready for occupancy before the first of June, according to announcement.

Work Starts on Remodeling of Building—Workmen yesterday started work on the remodeling of the former Oregon Power building on Willamette street recently occupied by the Berry Furniture and Piano company. The building has been purchased by the Steinmeyer brothers, proprietors of the Ideal bakery now located at the corner of Willamette and Ninth avenue east. The entire lower floor of the new quarters of the firm will be remodeled for the use of the bakery and the present stairway connecting the upper floor will be extended.

Survey Crew at Work—To survey land between the lower and Fall Creek a crew of county surveyors has started work. The maps will be made to present to the Southern Pacific railroad in a proposal for the elimination of grade crossings in that district.

Trout Fry Cases Are Shipped—A shipment of cases owned by the Oregon state fish and game commission in which are transported trout fry has arrived here for the state fish hatchery. They have been returned from the Montana State fish hatchery at Emigrant, Mont.

Lost Dog Is Recovered—"Eugene Balle," the prize-winning Irish setter belonging to H. C. Auld of this city, and which escaped from the Portland dog show last week, has been recovered and will be returned to the owner here, according to word received from Portland.

Property Valued at \$4500—The property of the estate of T. J. Wilson, deceased, is valued at \$4500, according to the inventory of the appraiser, W. T. Gordon. A. A. Rogers and Clyde R. Gray, filed in probate court yesterday. The property consists of a residence property on Franklin boulevard.

Medical Society Has Meeting—The quarterly meeting of the Central Willamette Valley Medical society comprising medical men from Lane, Lincoln, Benton and Lincoln counties was held here last evening at the Osburn hotel. Visiting medical men from Portland were here to attend the meeting and discuss papers that were read.

Castle Theatre Has Improved Ventilation System—Improvement to the ventilating system of the Castle theatre are being made by E. M. Drew and the air shafts are being increased in size to provide a better circulation. It is not expected that the Castle theatre will be closed during the summer as was the plan last year, according to A. H. McDonald, owner.

Oregon Drug Company Has Paid Up Capital—The additional \$25,000 of stock of the Oregon Drug company which had been issued but not distributed has been purchased by the shareholders and the total paid in capital of the organization is now \$100,000, according to officials of the corporation. The additional capital will provide facilities for the increasing demands of the business, is the announcement.

Postoffice Business Increases—An increase of 11 per cent over the same period last year in the business transacted at the Eugene postoffice during the past three months is shown in a report issued by Postmaster D. E. Moran, but owing to the recent order curtailing the force of employees at the office and the carriers there are less men to handle the increased mail and the people may expect an impaired service, said the postmaster.

Bees Brought to Lane County—The fruit growers of the county have recently obtained quite a large number of hives of bees from the state college at Corvallis to place in their orchards to help increase the blossoms, according to J. O. Holt, manager of the Eugene Fruit Growers' association. Mr. Holt said that the growers of this locality need bees badly. As soon as bright weather comes again the insect will begin to work in earnest.

Auto Electrical Firm Expands—Brakel and Walte, now located at 83 Seventh avenue east, are moving into quarters at 235 Oak street. This will be their temporary quarters pending the erection of their new building. This move is made necessary by the growing demand for efficient auto electrical service. When permanently settled their service will be completed by the installation of the latest battery service equipment.

Boy Taken Up Club Work—Guy Gilmore, son of George H. Gilmore, well-known Junction City farmer, has taken up calf club work, according to J. G. Swan, county club leader. There is no calf club in his community and he will conduct the work alone. He has bought a fine Jersey calf. Miss Ida Markson, also of the Junction City community, who was a member of the Junction City swim club last year, has joined the Riverview club as her old club failed to reorganize.

Plans Made for Kwanzaa Convocation—An outline of the entertainment plans for the delegates who will attend the annual national convention of the Kwanzaa clubs to be held at Atlanta, Ga., the last week in May, has been made here by local officials of the organization. A "Plantation Night" extravaganza during which the Kwanzaa may try their hand at picking cotton is one of the features of the convocation.

Those who have not paid the first half of their 1923 taxes will hereafter be compelled to pay a penalty of one per cent a month on the amount due until it is paid. Yesterday was the last day to pay at the sheriff's office without being charged this penalty. Sheriff Steele said that the tax collecting department of the office has been crowded during the past few days and payments have been coming in regularly for some time past.

A large percentage of the taxes have come in this time by mail and many of the letters have not yet been opened but those that bear a postmark dated yesterday or before will be accepted without being classed as delinquent.

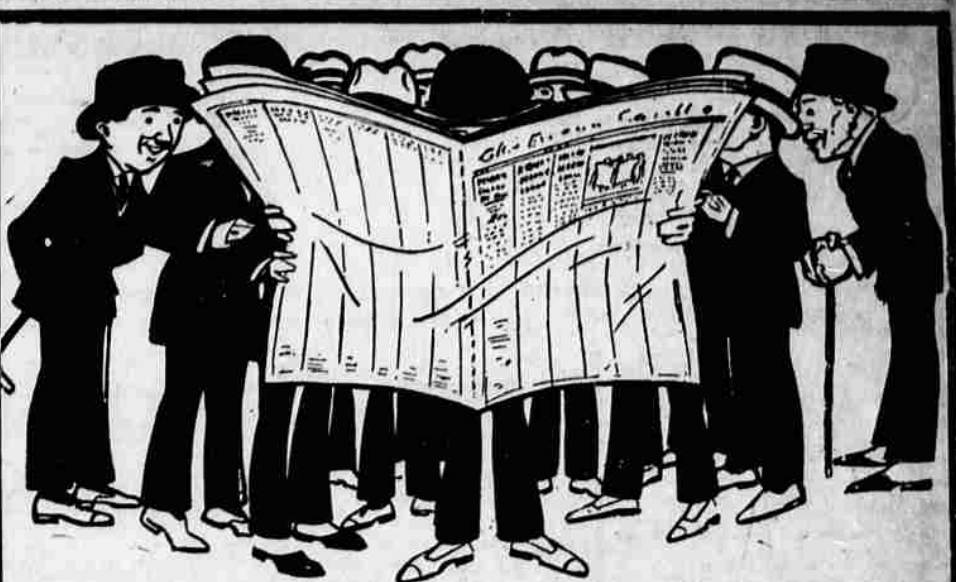
