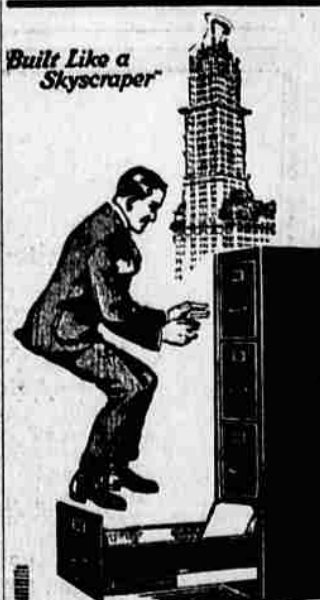

MARKET ROADS NAMED

BETTER DESCRIPTION GIVEN BY COUNTY COURT

Order Designating Routes of Over Forty Different Projects Is Made

The forty or more market roads in Lane county were more definitely described than before in an order made by the county court yesterday. The previous order on establishing market roads failed to give a complete description, in some cases a number of the roads overlapping and in others gaps were left in them. The location of the different roads as stated in yesterday's order follows:

Blachly road—County roads Nos. 306, 385, 264, 948, 901, 907, 908, 466 and 506. From the Pacific road to Blachly postoffice, Low Pass road.

Eugene-Lorane road—County roads Nos. 846, 444, 880, 891 and 729. From Eugene to Lorane postoffice.

Cottage Grove-Lorane—County roads Nos. 445 and 858, from Cottage Grove to Lorane postoffice.

Willamette road—County road No. 816, from Cottage postoffice to county road No. 360, near Lowell postoffice.

Elmira road—County roads Nos. 131, 847 and 852, from Eugene to Elmira postoffice.

Veneta-Crow road—County road No. 155, from county road No. 847 south to county road No. 918, Elmira road to Hadleyville road.

Cogwell Hill road—County road No. 225, Thurston to Hendricks bridge (now a state road).

Mohawk road—County roads Nos. 322, 321, 14, 217, 431 and 346, from Hayden bridge to Donna station.

Lowell-Fall Creek road—County roads Nos. 82, 942 and 266, from county road No. 916, near Lowell, to bridge over Little Fall creek, in Sec. 23, T. 19, S. R. 1 W.

Lost Creek road—County road No. 854.

Noti road—County roads Nos. 920 and 962, from Noti postoffice to ending points of said roads.

Bridges at Lathan and Cottage Grove (now state road).

Long Tom West in District No. 82—County road No. 247, between Long Tom and Bear Creek.

Pacific highway, Cottage Grove south—County road No. 911 (now state road).

Olson's Corner to Crow Hill—County road No. 323, from Coyote Creek to foot of Crow hill.

Coburg north—County road No. 34, from Coburg north to county line.

Jasper-Natron—County road No. 43, 820 and 266, from McKenzie highway to bridge over Little Fall creek, in Sec. 23, T. 19, S. R. 1 W.

Cushman west—Road from Cushman station to North Fork road No. 733.

Mapleton east—County road No. 100, from Mapleton to Rainrock.

City Limit-South—Willamette street—County road No. 13.

Crow Stage-Central school section—(Part of No. 15).

Fall Creek-Unity bridge section—(Part of No. 15).

County road No. 505, from road No. 251 to road No. 938.

Hampton road—County road No. 8.

Hayden Bridge-Camp Creek—County road No. 598, from Hayden bridge to County road No. 847 (included in No. 25).

Adrian-Noti—County road No. 92, from Elmira postoffice to Noti postoffice.

Graham road—County road No. 883, around Jackson Point.

Danebo road—County road No. 119, from Elmira to Crow road.

Gibson road—County road No. 897, from Elmira road to Alvadore Meadows bridge—On No. 43.

Hadleyville bridge to Milligan corners—Hayden bridge to McKenzie highway, includes No. 25.

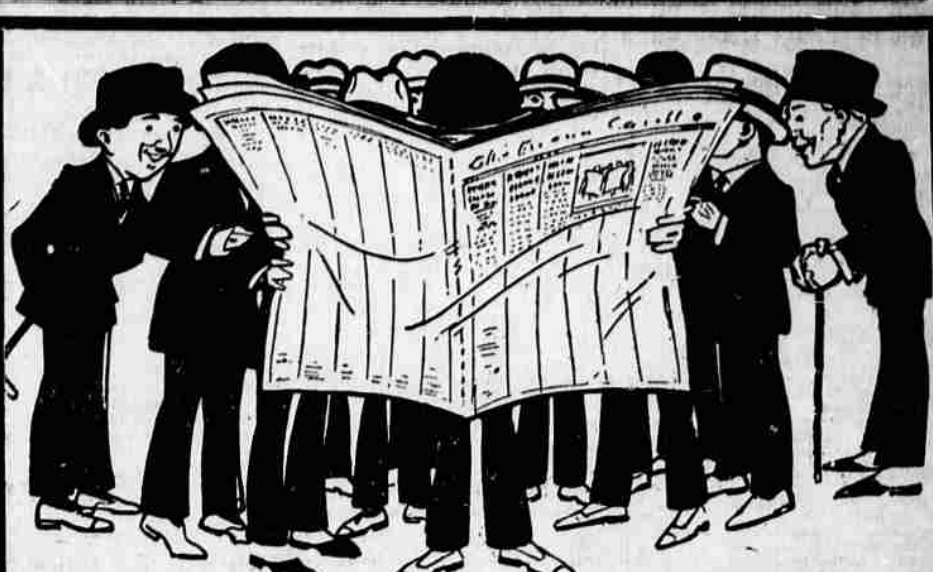
Coburg road north to county line—On hill road, same as No. 16.
