## MRS. EUBANKS IS CALLED

### DECEASED WAS RELATIVE OF ABRAHAM LINCOLN

HARRISBURG, Ore., April 7.—(Special to the Register.)—Mrs. W. A. Taylor's mother, Mrs. Polly Eubanks, who passed away here Monday forenoon at the daughter's home, had the distinction of being a relative of Abraham Lincoln, America's martyred president, the mother of Mrs. Eubanks and Lincoln's mother being sisters. In addition to this, Mrs. Eubanks was quite a distinction as a pioneer of Oregon, having crossed the plains to this state in 1852.  
Mrs. Eubanks was born in Iowa, November 26, 1843, being nearly 80 years of age at her death. Nine years later she came west with her parents, to make her home in the Roseburg vicinity. Here she was married on April 17, 1857 to John Eubank. They became the parents of six children, only two of whom are living. She was twice married; the second marriage occurring in March of 1877 to P. G. Eubanks, at Oakland. His death occurred there in 1908, but Mrs. Eubanks continued her residence at that place until a few months ago when she took up her home with her daughter. In her second marriage two children were born, but both died while infants. The

The two children surviving are Mrs. Taylor of this place and Owen Buthelin of Oakland, and in addition two sisters survive: Mrs. Carrie Herman, of Myrtle Creek and Mrs. Abbie Carroll, of Portland.
