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CLEANUP PLAN IS BIG

MRS. BEAN, PRESIDENT OF FEDERATION, TELLS PLANS

Covers Not Only Eugene But University School Grounds Fraternity Houses and Others

"We owe it to the state, to the university, and to ourselves," is the way Mrs. Louis E. Bean, president of the Eugene Federation of Women's Organizations, feels about the tremendous plan that body is outlining for the "beautifying of Eugene"—a plan which covers in its tentative scope of activity, school grounds, university and fraternity house grounds, vacant lots, city property, park plots, and the park behind the butte.

"The federation is not only a federation of clubs, but a federation of organizations, thus covering a much broader field of interest," said Mrs. Bean. "There are 25 clubs affiliated with us at the present time, representing approximately 1000 women, whose time and effort has been given to Parent-Teacher organizations, A. A. U. W., the Fortnightly club, ladies' aid societies, or some one of various other types of groups, all of whom have banded together with civic welfare for their aim."

Beginning the planning simultaneously with the activities of "cleanup week" with the object of bringing it forcefully before the public is the present design of the society and to this end a plan of educational agitation will be embarked upon by means of displays in store windows, exercises in the schools, announcements from the platforms of churches. It is not as yet a complete plan, says Mrs. Bean, merely a beginning of a great civic movement which will have to be kept on its feet after it is put there.

A committee comprising Mosell, Hair, chairman, Mrs. W. F. Jewett, Mrs. P. M. Wilkins, Mrs. N. F. Macduff and Mrs. Seth Laraway will work with Professor A. R. Sweetner and Professor Wilcox of the university to make a series of permanent plans for the beautifying of campus and city. Another committee composed of Mrs. Ida Campbell, Mrs. P. L. Campbell and Mrs. P. C. Walters is in charge of the exchange of ideas with Mrs. N. Schaefer and Mrs. Cressley. Interviewed the business men soliciting support in the matter of window advertisement and report unqualified support. This form of advertising will continue all of cleanup week, according to the beautification plan of the mayor issued yesterday, will cover Monday, April 9, to Saturday, April 14. The mayor endorsed the plans of the women's federation urging the support of the city.

H. M. Fisher, superintendent of grounds at the university, is planning to give roses, shrubs and plants for the various fraternity houses which undertake the beautification plan, and he is also providing trees and shrubs to be planted around the courthouse. John MacGregor, president of the student body of the university, is chairman of a committee which will care for the campus in the campaign. Professor DeCou and H. M. Fisher constitute the rest of the committee.

Vacant lots will be handled by Mrs. J. H. K. May, president of the A. A. U. W., and Mrs. F. L. Poindester, and Mrs. Poindester, as president of the Parent-Teacher associations, will work with associations and principals to beautify the school grounds. Arbor day in the schools will be observed by the planting of trees.

Mrs. Bean has conceived a plan, and more important, is working the plan out, that will be a great and lasting service to Eugene if carried through. And somehow, as you sit listening to her discuss it, everything ready to go, you feel sure that she is right, and that she is the director people that will work. The only thing you wonder about is why no one ever did it before. It all sounds so well now that it is organized and started.

EUGENE BOY IS STAR GUN POINTER IN NAVY

Is Aboard Dreadnaught New Mexico Now With Fleet Cruising in Pacific Waters

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 7.—Cruising about the Pacific and visiting the various ports along the west coast, Robert Gail Hendricks, son of Mrs. Elizabeth Hendricks, 2233 Fifteenth avenue east, Eugene, is now a member of the United States marine guard on the dreadnaught New Mexico, one of the battleships of the Pacific fleet. Hendricks has made a name for himself on the New Mexico, and is regarded as one of the star gun pointers of anti-aircraft guns in the entire navy.

He joined the marines at their recruiting station in Portland July 22, 1922, and for several months was stationed at Mare Island, Cal. Later he was assigned to duty on the New Mexico, where the marines are trained to man certain types of guns and to perform guard duties. Occasionally the marines come ashore for practice marches, to visit the larger cities on the Pacific Coast when the vessel drops anchor near Los Angeles or San Francisco.

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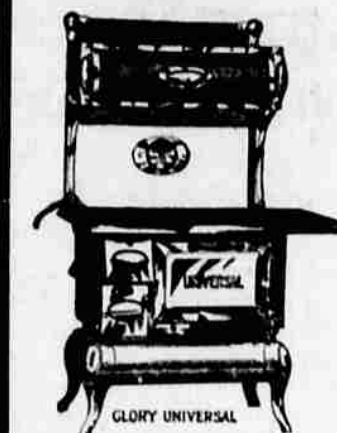
