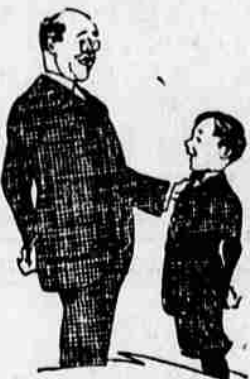
John Seaver Returns—John N. Seaver, who has been employed in the sawmill at Tiernan, is here for a few days to visit his family.

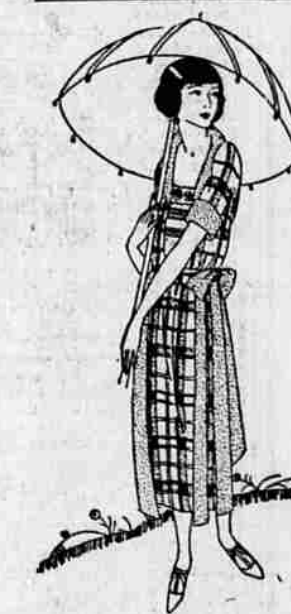
