**RESTLING, BOXING TAUGHT
YOUNG ARISTOCRATS**
Junior Champion Mat Man Opens
School Where Rich Pupils
Are Taught Athletics

NEW YORK, April 7.—A school for hard-knocks where the poor rich sons of Wall street must learn to take punishment and learn to take punishment in New York.

Its location is aristocratic old Madison avenue. Its headmaster is Carl R. Temple, a former champion wrestler, gassed in the world war. Most of his pupils are "J's" or "I's" or "H's" after their names, and arrive at classes in limousines attended by valets and nurses.

On the curriculum are boxing, wrestling, jiu jitsu, fencing and all the arts of manly defense. The main goal at a recent exhibition was announced as follows: "Ladies and gentlemen: In this corner we have Nathaniel Wailes, weighing thirty-nine pounds, twelve years old, of Connecticut, seventh avenue, Boston, and eighth avenue, New York.

"And in this corner we have Stuart Davis, Jr., weighing forty-nine pounds, ringside, eight years old, the pride of Madison avenue, who will meet today in a three-round bout for the child championship of the Upper Four Hundred."

CLAN CONTROL SHIFTED

**AFFAIRS PLACED IN HANDS OF
THIRTEEN PERSONS**

ATLANTA, Ga., April 7.—After weeks of hard bickering between supporters of William Joseph Simmons, emperor, and H. W. Evans, imperial wizard, the affairs of the Ku Klux Klan today were placed in the hands of a commission of thirteen men, to be administered by them pending further orders from the court.

Superior Judge E. D. Thomas, in announcing his decision today, named Mr. Simmons, Mr. Evans and J. M. George, marshal of the municipal court, as the committee to carry on the operations of the Klan. Following the action in Judge Thomas' court, T. J. McKinnon, chief investigator for the Klan, and N. N. Furney, cashier of the order, were placed on trial in Municipal Judge T. O. Hatchcock's court on charges of larceny after trust. Both were dismissed for lack of sufficient evidence. McKinnon was alleged to have removed checks for approximately \$20,000 belonging to the Klan, while Furney was charged with removing \$100,000 of the organization's money.

TROT RECORD IS HUNG UP

**COUPLE TRIP FOR 36 HOURS
AND 13 MINUTES**

NEW YORK, April 7.—A new world's record for continuous dancing was claimed today by Miss Ruth Hollock and Jack Butler who tripped the waxed floors of a Broadway jazz palace for 36 hours and 13 minutes. The old record was 27 hours, recently set by Miss Alma Cummings of Texas with several partners.

Miss Hollock and Butler, who began to fox trot at 9:47 o'clock Thursday night, finished in a wait at 10 o'clock this morning. Miss Hollock lost eight pounds and wore out two pairs of shoes and stockings, while Butler was ten pounds lighter and minus a pair of thick-soled shoes and socks.

Miss Hollock apparently had more reserve energy at the finish than her partner, a World war veteran, for she sank into an easy chair and chatted gaily with the hundred or more sleepy-eyed spectators who stayed for the finish. Butler retired for sleep.

UNITY OF ACTION URGED

**SENATOR JONES APPEALS TO
MEMBERS OF CONGRESS**

WASHINGTON, April 7.—Appealing to the Republican members of congress for unity of action and to the administration for cooperation, Senator Wesley L. Jones of Washington, who led the administration fight for the shipping bill, issued a statement today declaring that unless the majority functions in the next congress it will be discredited.

"With all our frank exchange of views," said Senator Jones, "mutual concessions will be made and success assured. Otherwise, even if people of the country believe in the fundamental policies of the Republican party, they will not continue to use that party as an instrument of government while it shows by its lack of cohesion that it cannot bring results."

"Individuals," said Senator Jones, "may gain some temporary advantage by action outside of the party, but it will not last, there is a failure in the solution of these problems, individuals will suffer by the discredit of the party." Some senators, he added, were "gumshoeing."

SECTIONAL JEALOUSY HIT

**LOCAL PREJUDICES MENACE
TO DEFENSE SAYS SIMS**

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 5.—Sectional jealousies along the Pacific coast constitute the greatest menace to the defenses of western America, Rear Admiral William Snowden Sims, United States navy, retired, told members of the university club today.

"A board of naval officers has been appointed to survey the Pacific coast and to make recommendations as to proper defenses," he said. "It is your duty as citizens to abide by these recommendations and to refuse to let local pride interfere in the accomplishment of a necessary work."

"The defense of the Pacific coast is a national problem and, if you convince the powers at Washington that this is true, and show them you are willing to lay aside local prejudices in the accomplishment of the same, your coast will be properly taken care of, without delay."

LOVERS PAY TO FOIL SPIRITS

**New York Woman Is Convicted of
Extorting \$600**

NEW YORK.—Mrs. Rose Santora was convicted by a jury of extorting money from Edward Stoppelo and his fiancée, Katie Diouff, with the aid of theatrical spirits.

Stoppelo testified that on the eve of his marriage to Katie, his fiancée's stepmother warned him that evil spirits were seeking his death. She induced him, he said, to go to Mrs. Santora.

Mrs. Santora convinced him and his fiancée, he testified, that the only way he could keep life long enough to wed was by burning money. So Eddie gave her money to burn \$600 in one lump and several smaller payments. He also paid for a mystic bodyguard to ride on the truck he drove, warding off the evil spirits.

Mrs. Santora denied the charges, asserting the case grew out of enmity between Katie and her stepmother. It took the jury only 15 minutes, however, to find her guilty. The maximum punishment is 20 years' imprisonment.

MURDER VENDETTA DEED

**BODIES OF MRS. BLANDINO,
MISS McMAHON HACKED**

NEW YORK, April 7.—Authorities investigating the murder of Mrs. Irene Blandino of Jersey City and that of Miss Beatie McMahon of Eliza, N. J., whose bodies were found in a road on Staten Island early yesterday, voiced the conviction that the crime was the result of a vendetta. Bayonne, N. J., identified the body of Miss McMahon tonight as that of Miss Ethel Phillips, 17 years old, who lived with her parents in Bayonne. She disappeared from her home two weeks ago, police said.

Detective Captain Von Wagner, in charge of the investigation, said he was endeavoring to learn the nature of information possessed by Mrs. Blandino regarding the murder of her first husband, Frank Boggiovanni, who is said to have been the leader of a gang in Jersey City, and who died several years ago after an artery in his leg had been severed by a stiletto. According to Von Wagner, Mrs. Blandino told intimate friends the names of men whom she suspected of having killed her first husband.

CAPTAIN DERBY KILLED

**PLANE CRASH FATAL TO POP-
ULAR ARMY AVIATOR**

DAYTON, Ohio, April 7.—Captain Richard Derby, 28, of Tacoma, Wash., flyer, McCook field here, was instantly killed when his plane fell 1500 feet near the field today. He was flying a Thomas-Morse scout plane.

Captain Derby was married and had one child, 18 months old. He had been at McCook field since August 15, 1922, and in the air service since 1921, coming here from Florida. He enlisted in the Coast artillery August 8, 1917.

TACOMA, Wash., April 7.—Captain Richard Derby, killed in an airplane accident at Dayton, Ohio, today, was one of the most popular officers at Camp Lewis during the war. He married Miss Anita Virges, member of prominent Tacoma family, and the wedding, held in San Francisco, where Captain Derby was then stationed, attracted wide social interest. Captain Derby's mother and sister live in San Francisco, and his father, now deceased, was a California railway man. William Virges, father-in-law of the dead officer, will leave today for Dayton.

SCALES OF JUSTICE TILT IN RIOT TRIALS

statement, could of course, only apply to the imported gunmen, the overwhelming testimony showing that two of these imported gunmen, witnesses for the state, who testified in this capacity, were in the Herrin city jail at the time they claimed to have seen the occurrence about which they testified, and also in plain contradiction of the fact that not a single witness has been intimidated, assaulted or threatened by reason of his attempt to testify for the people.

Claim Statutes, "Judge. "It is unjust to say that men sitting upon a jury, qualifying under the law, accepted by the defense and openly accepted by the prosecution, based their verdict upon improper motives. When this jury was accepted the prosecution still had left in the neighborhood of one hundred peremptory challenges. What right has been granted to those who prosecute to say what motives actuated jurors? Who gives them the right to determine the right or wrong in this prosecution? Who gives them the right to supplant the constitutional triers of fact in this state? Who gives them the right to impugn the motives of the constitutional officers of the court?"

"Regarding the opinions as to the conduct of the trial judge in passing upon the qualification of jurors, we as lawyers accept this conduct as we have done during our entire professional career. Surely the public by this time must be becoming suspicious. Every time that a labor controversy is at issue in a law suit in this state, the motives are always charged to labor in the few cases which they are fortunate enough to win at the bar of justice."

"The fact that jurors were brave enough and intelligent enough to seek the Herrin case upon their merits is evidence of the intelligence of the citizenship of Williamson county rather than of moral degeneracy."

YEOMAN IS SUSPECTED SLAYER OF CHURCHMAN

**C. B. HICKS HELD FOR MUR-
DER OF RABBI LAFFEE**

Bluejacket Is Identified as Man
Who Registered at Hotel on
Evening Preceding Crime

VALLEJO, Cal., April 7.—C. B. Hicks, a yeoman, held at the Mare Island navy yard for the San Francisco police in connection with a fatal assault which was made upon Rabbi Alfred G. Laffee, was identified tonight by Miss Louise Hewitt, 18-year-old runaway delinquent of Los Angeles, as the same man who was registered at San Francisco hotel on the day preceding the assault upon the rabbi.

The identification by Miss Hewitt is regarded by police department handwriting experts as a significant link as they study the handwriting on the register "H. B. Hicks" was done by the same person who registered as Hickman with Rabbi Laffee at the Gates hotel where the rabbi was assaulted on the following night.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 7.—A detail from the detective bureau of the San Francisco police department accompanied by Miss Louise Hewitt, 18, said to be a delinquent runaway girl from Los Angeles, and by Belleville Tompkins, night clerk at the Gates hotel here, went to Vallejo today for the purpose of identifying C. B. Hicks, a seaman held at the Mare Island navy yard as the possible murderer of Rabbi Alfred G. Laffee of this city. The Hewitt girl's relation to the case has not been made public.

Tompkins was on duty at the hotel when Rabbi Laffee entered the place Tuesday night, according to a stranger in the uniform of a United States sailor. The sailor left the hotel alone about eight hours later and Rabbi Laffee was found Wednesday morning in the room he had occupied with the stranger, senseless from a crushed skull and the effects of a choking. He died yesterday at the Mt. Zion hospital.
