LONDON, April 12.—A Reuter dispatch from Cairo today declares there is no truth in the report that Howard Carter, the American Egyptologist, co-discoverer of the late Lord Carnarvon of the tomb of Tutankhamen, has been taken ill. Mr. Carter, it asserts, will shortly return from Cairo to Luxor.

TOTS RECOVERING AFTER 44 HOUR STAY IN CLOSET

CHILDREN BELIEVED DEAD FOUND IN VACANT ROOM

"We Couldn't Get Out So We Said Our Prayers," Explained Little Theresa, Age 3

WARREN, O., April 12.—After being imprisoned in a vacant second story room of a downtown building for 44 hours, Theresa Sanford, 3, John Williams, 2, and his sister Margaret, 5 years of age, tonight were recovering from the ill-effects of their long confinement without food and water. The children had selected the closet, about 6 feet by 2, to play. They were trapped when the door with a small spring lock, swung shut.

Urges Bible Study in School

SALEM, Ore., April 12.—The Salem Ministerial union is attempting to have the Oregon, Indiana, and Tennessee Bible study, an instruction established in the Salem schools. With one exception the members of the school board who commented on the plan were doubtful as to its feasibility. Feeling it would not meet with the approval of the community, one member was in favor of it.

Trail Blazers Need Food

MIAMI, Fla., April 12.—Balked today by new rainstorms in the Everglades the land plane obtained by Miami Herald to carry food supplies to the 22 members of the Tamiami Trail Blazers party in the heart of the vast waste lands, will make another attempt at dawn tomorrow to get away. The party is about 60 miles from Miami and their food supplies were reported to be very low by three of the trailblazers who made their way here early today.

Horseshoer Brings Prize Stable

SALEM, Ore., April 12.—Roy L. Davis, nationally known as a horseman and sportsman, arrived here today from Kansas City with 25 head of fancy show horses valued at \$60,000 and will make his home here. His string of horses is stable at the state fair grounds here. From here, Mr. Davis will make the horse shows up and down the Pacific coast.

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WALTER HIGGINBOTHAM IS HELD FOR CONVICTS MURDER

MADISON, Wis., April 12.—Walter Higginbotham, convict camp boss, was indicted here today for the murder in the first degree by the Madison county grand jury.

CHARGES AGAINST HIGGINBOTHAM Grew out of an alleged whipping he gave Martin Tabert of North Dakota, while Tabert was serving a three months' sentence in the camp of the Putnam Lumber company at Clara, Florida. Tabert died three days after the whipping.

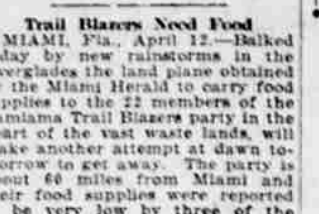

DEMANDS OF LABORITES

CRISIS IN DIPLOMACY BRIDGED BY COMMON SENSE

Situation Surmounted on Promise That Committees Will Probe Grievances of War Veterans

LONDON, April 12.—The parliamentary crisis was quietly surmounted today when the government, having yielded to the laborite demands and undertaken to appoint a committee to investigate the grievances of ex-service men, the opposition permitted a motion that the speaker leave the chair to be put without further resistance.

BULKHEAD OLD DEVICE

MARCO POLO'S FLEET FIRST TO ADOPT PRINCIPLE

WASHINGTON, April 12.—The heirs of Marco Polo, the Venetian explorer, who introduced Columbus by some 200 years might preserve legal right to royalty fees against the newest American battleships, according to a study just completed by naval construction experts. It found that the use of bulkheads in a ship's hull originated in the first century B. C. in a Chinese port in 1192 under Admiral Mi P'oh.
