DEAN STRAUB HONORED

VETERAN MEMBER OF FACULTY GIVEN PAINTING

Dr. John Straub, dean of men of the University of Oregon, the oldest member of the faculty and the one who has served as a member longest, has been presented with one of Professor Alfred H. Schreff's paintings by the university faculty as a remembrance of his seventieth birthday. The presentation was made by President P. L. Campbell.

This is Dean Straub's 45th year in university service. Several grandchildren of his first students are now in school. He looks back to the time when there was but one building, Deady hall, on the campus—a building which stood alone on a hill, bare except for the two old Condon oaks. He remembers when the ground on which Friendship hall the men's dormitory, now stands, was a marshy place.

The dean graduated from Mercersburg academy in Pennsylvania in 1876. He took one year of graduate work, taught another year there and then came to Oregon. Since that time he has been continuously on the faculty here.

The picture presented to Dean Straub is a water color called "Wind Blown Cypress at Point Lobos." It was painted by Professor Schreff of the university school of architecture and allied arts at Carmel, Cal.

Dropped from Enrollment Records at University for Failure to Make Required Credits

The grade reports for the winter term just closed at the university show that 33 undergraduate women and 20 men received grades placing them on the honor roll for the quarter. In the graduate school 15 of those enrolled attained honor standing.

The requirement for honor students is that the grades in all subjects be in the B classification, or better. The grades are divided into seven parts. They are satisfactory for honors, class I, class II, class III, class IV, class V and failure.
