BOND TAXES DISCUSSED

PROPOSAL TO ABOLISH EXEMPTION IS OPPOSED

E. J. Adams Tells Kiwanians That Present Outstanding Securities Would Raise in Value

Prohibition of future issue of tax exempt securities by an amendment to the national constitution which has been proposed is not to the best interests of the western states and is backed mainly by eastern financial concerns, at present heavy holders of western bonds, according to E. J. Adams, secretary to Senator Stanford, who spoke yesterday at the noon luncheon meeting of the Eugene Kiwanian club. The proposed amendment was lost during the last session of congress but it is still a live national issue and will undoubtedly be brought out for action at the next congressional meeting, according to Mr. Adams.

The speaker in his talk in opposition to the proposal explained the motives of the financial interests in desiring that the tax-exempt security issue be abolished in the future. At present there are about fifteen billion dollars in tax free securities outstanding representing in the main, state county and municipal bonds of the western states in addition to farm loan bonds. If the tax exemption plan is repealed the present outstanding bonds will immediately rise in value owing to the advantages that they will retain over all future issues which will not have the tax free privilege. Mr. Adams stated. This increase in value will amount to about one billion dollars, he said, and the increase would all go to the present eastern financial concerns which hold the securities.

Mr. Adams also declared that the placing of a tax on state and county bonds and particularly on the farm loan issues would be a hardship on borrowers especially on farmers.

BRIDGE CONTRACT IS LET

CLARK AND BISHOP TO BUILD FRANKLIN SPAN

Member of Firm Promises That There Will Be No Delay as There Has Been on Paving Job

The contract for the construction of the concrete bridge over the mill race on Franklin boulevard was let last night by the city council to the Clark and Bishop Construction company, who have the contract to lay the cement pavement on Franklin. The council was called in special session by the mayor for this purpose. This company's bid for the work was \$9839 others tendered were as follows: John T. Long, \$11,230; Stein Brothers, \$10,540; Geo. W. Reed, \$10,400; Guy Fyle, \$9988.

C. A. Clark, head of the firm, stated at the meeting that he had made all arrangements to finance the project and that there would be no delay. He said that there is a slight shortage of cement but that he had enough in sight to complete the job.

This company has been a long time completing its paving contract on Franklin boulevard, many delays having occurred for one reason or another, and the council wanted to be assured that there would not be similar delays in the bridge work. Mr. Clark said that work had been resumed on the pavement job and that if the weather is good it will require but a few days to complete it.

OLD RESIDENCE BOUGHT

HOUSE BUILT IN EARLY 50s TO BE MOVED SOON

What is believed to be the oldest residence in Eugene has been purchased by Frank L. Chambers from W. L. Coppernoll and the new owner plans to have the house moved to another site in the near future, make way for the new home of Mr. Coppernoll, work on which has already been started. The house built in the early 50s stands at 935 High street and has been occupied by Mr. Coppernoll for the past several years. During the early days of the history of Eugene the house was built on a site about 250 feet to the east of the present location on Ninth avenue. The present building is said to be inadequate to meet the needs of the district, which is growing quite rapidly.

LAWN CONTESTS PLANNED

CHAMBER AUXILIARY WILL OFFER PRIZES

Competition for Trophy for Best Looking Door Yard Will Be Encouraged This Summer

Arrangements for the holding of two lawn contests here during the summer as a part of the "Eugene Beautiful" movement have been outlined by the civic committee of the women's auxiliary of the Eugene chamber of commerce. It is planned to have one of the prize contests in July and the second in August and a list of prizes has been prepared for the two events. The best kept lawns according to the decision of a board of judges will be selected as the winners. The prizes will consist of a first award of \$10, second \$5 and third and fourth prizes of \$2.50 each. A similar set of awards is planned for the event in August.

The members of the auxiliary committee state that the organization is making efforts to cooperate in the beautification plan of the city with other organizations that have been active in the movement. The rules and regulations that will govern the judging of the lawns and the awarding of the prizes will be formulated at a meeting of the committee planned for the near future, is the announcement.

The chamber of commerce auxiliary is also again urging that all local residents who are interested in flowers to plant dahlia bulbs in order to have the plants ready for the show that is to be held in the fall by the organization.

BIG TRACT IS PLANTED

THREE HUNDRED ACRES SET TO FIR TREES

One hundred eighty thousand fir trees are being planted on Mount Hebo, in the Tillamook section of the Siuslaw national forest and the work is about half completed, according to Ralph S. Shelley, supervisor of the forest who has just returned from an inspection trip to that portion of the forest. The work was started early this spring.

About 12 years ago the forest service planted fir, oak and alder trees on this tract, the oak and alder being an experiment. Supervisor Shelley said that the firs have been doing well and have made a remarkable growth but many of the others died and only about 100,000 are left.

The hundred eighty thousand young fir trees will cover about 200 acres, said Supervisor Shelley. Arrangements are being made to erect a forest fire lookout house on top of Mount Hebo. The materials are on hand and the work will start at once said the supervisor.

people "hold secure" to those paths made by the fathers of the republic. In this connection the executive spoke of the founding of the republic and pointed out that at that time "no group arrogated to itself all the political righteousness of the young republic."

Useful Devotion Prime Need "Our country will have done well," said Mr. Harding, "when it is assured on the full enlistment of

all the unselfish devotion of its womanhood in the supreme duty of upholding the sentiments of real Americanism in the hearts of all our citizens.

"The Daughters of the Revolution have preserved for us all a lesson in the desirability of forbearance, patience and toleration. In the beginning of the nation there were wide divergences of judgment about institutions, methods, directions, means and measures. Fortunately for our country's great experiment, there was a sufficient endowment of wisdom, moderation and selfishness to make possible the adjustment of all the differences. The great project of a government of the people, for the people, by the people, was set forth in the world because no group or faction or narrow interest assumed to be or to represent all the people. No group arrogated to itself all the political righteousness of the young republic.

Founding Fathers Found Way

"It is good to recall the beginning. The war-torn world of today easily might find a helpful lesson and cheering encouragement therein. In a chaos of victory, prostrate in material fortunes, wrecked financially, with interests conflicting and ideas opposing, the founding fathers found a way to union and concerted effort to restoration and attainment. World wonder, sometimes world envy, has attended the astounding development. But there has come to us a glorious country, a cherished nationality, an inheritance which is an inspiration to preserve and we have the prospect of future advancement for ourselves and helpfulness to the world, ever to impel America onward."

The President said the republic had "never been remiss except in one thing."

"I speak of it now," he continued, "because I rejoice in your efforts to correct that remissness. We offered much and we asked too little. It is not right for anybody on each to have the fortunes, the privileges, the favors and the opportunities of American citizenship without assuming every duty and every obligation thereof."

"I want America to preserve the things that come to us and then, in the best consciousness of the republic, to go on for ourselves and to play our just part in helping humanity forward throughout the world."

Calls on Women for Duty

Mrs. Minor, in the first address, asked American women to link themselves together for a battle against influences at work to destroy American institutions and suggested that a portion of the American public school system presented a fitting place to begin such a crusade.

More than 3000 teachers in American schools, Mrs. Minor asserted, not only are disloyal to their country, but are using their positions to disseminate disloyal doctrines and discard the ideals of the American nation. She asked the organization to see that teachers in their various localities be compelled to confine themselves to patriotic methods of instruction.

The execution of Vice-General Butchavitch in Russia the President said, was an outward manifestation of a government policy which denies the home, the country and God. As an evidence that all is not well with the administration of justice in the United States, she instanced the trial of William Z. Foster in Michigan and the failure to secure convictions in the Herrin mine prosecutions.

No Room for Radicals

"It is time to awaken to this danger," she said, "and to tell all radical agitators that there is no room in this country for the reds."

The pacifists, Mrs. Minor said, are trying to disarm America and kill patriotism in the hearts of her defenders. But she declared that was a vain dream.

The president-general withheld her approval of birth control, which she thought might make toward destruction of the American home, but she suggested that the modern tendencies which are attacking the American home are less dangerous than they have been pictured.

Girl Victim of Motorist

PENITENT, ORE., April 16.—Yorna Bittner, 14, was run over today by a passing automobile as she stepped from a school bus on the highway six miles east of this city. She died tonight from the injuries. B. D. Landell, 2, of Eugene, who was driving a car into Pendleton, was placed in the county jail on a charge of reckless driving, pending an inquest.

Clara Phillips Is Located

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 16.—Mrs. Clara Phillips, convicted "hammer murderer," who escaped from the Los Angeles county jail December 5, has been located in San Salvador, according to a copyrighted story in the Los Angeles Examiner today. Her apprehension is momentarily expected.
