PIONEER DIES AT DIVIDE

GEORGE W. McREYNOLDS PASSES AWAY AT HOME

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., April 17.—George Washington McReynolds, who has lived on a ranch at Divide ever since he came to Oregon in 1882, died at his home last night, just two days before he would have celebrated his 80th birthday anniversary. He was

Mr. McReynolds was born April 18, 1843. He served with Company C, Eighteenth Iowa infantry volunteers until that company was mustered out. In 1869 he married Miss Anna Lynch and to this union two children were born, Earnest McReynolds and Mrs. Eva Ellis, both of Divide. Six grandchildren also survive.
Funeral arrangements have not yet been made.

P-T. A. MEETING IS HELD

SUBJECT OF MOVING PICTURES IS DISCUSSED

Speakers Read Papers on the Value of Films in the Education of Pupils

CRESWELL, Ore., April 17.—The April meeting of the Parent-Teacher association was held Monday evening at the school house the subject being "Moving Pictures." After the routine business a program was presented. Mrs. R. E. McDaniel gave a resume of a paper by W. W. Hopkinson on the industry of moving picture-making showing that the large companies catered to the public demand freezing out some independent high class productions as popularity and easy money had influenced them to follow certain kinds of pictures. Mrs. Cora Olson read a paper on educational films which was the application of visual education which was very effective and attractive to the scholar.

List of Worthy Pictures Given
Mrs. H. C. Travillion gave a list of worthy pictures and actors which were highly recommended. Miss Lea gave a talk on the value of educational slides which the state university extension course provided for free use of schools which touched upon all lines and had the advantages over movies because the picture could be held for discussion. Other remarks by H. C. Travillion, Mrs. Perini, Mrs. Barnes and Mrs. Kirkham indicated that the teachers were eager for a moving picture machine for use in the schools and asked the co-operation of the parent teacher association which was heartily granted, to take measures to procure one.

A lantern slide machine could be secured for around fifty dollars while a moving picture machine could be purchased for between \$150 and \$200. The slides could be used for the latter and the advantage of the moving picture machine would be in furnishing entertainment for the public with the best of films. Mr. Travillion urged that a demand be made for Friday night as "school night" for its entertainment, social functions and meetings. A committee was appointed consisting of Mrs. Perini, Mrs. Barnes and Mrs. Shay to investigate the matter of machine prices and attitude of board to its installation.

UNION SERVICE IS HELD

CROWDED HOUSE GREETED W. J. HERWIG AT CRESWELL

Message of State Leader of Anti-Saloon League Is Delivered Sunday Evening

CRESWELL, Ore., April 16.—A crowded house greeted W. J. Herwig, of Portland, at the Christian church Sunday evening which was a union service, to hear the message of the state leader of the Anti-Saloon league. The good spirit of the meeting was enhanced with fine song services led by the son of the evangelist. Meetings being held at the church.
Rev. Jones, pastor of the church, presided and introduced the speaker who gave an earnest and instructive address. He pleaded for an aroused citizenship which was necessary in this crisis to enforce the adequate laws now written on the statute books. Oregon today has the best law machinery for handling the prohibition enforcement of any of the states. What it needs now is the moral backing of the people to encourage the officials to enforce the laws. He spoke of the great meeting held in Toronto last year in the interests of prohibition, the greatest meeting of the kind in history.

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Movie Aspirations May Cause Divorce

Divorce proceedings between Mr. and Mrs. James Vall Converse, wealthy society couple of New York, are reported to be imminent. Mrs. Converse is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Hays Morgan, the former being American consul general to Brussels. She started society in February, 1922, by eloping with Converse to Rockville, Md., the Gretna Green of Washington, and married him there. The rift in their relations is said to be due to Mrs. Converse's intention of entering the movies. Mrs. Converse has two sisters, one of whom was the recent bride of Reginald C. Vanderbilt, while the other only recently secured a Paris divorce from Jean, Count de Maupas.

Describes New Teeth in Laws

All they need now is enforcement, just as determined and forceful as the laws against murder, vice and crime are enforced and in the next generation the regard for prohibition enforcement would be just as loyal as the enforcement of any other law. The great organized work of the anti-prohibition forces now was to ridicule the present law enforcement of the prohibition laws. They had an election of officials and the work of a new congress in the near future and the next two years, therefore, were the years of crises in the movement.

At the close of the address, the male quartet of the Eugene Bible university dressed in immaculate dress suits, gave three selections that captured the crowd. They rushed from Eugene to Creswell after giving a concert there and the treat they offered was highly appreciated. Evangelist Levitt supported the message of Mr. Herwig with strong words of urgent appeal.

LUMBER COMBINE DENIED

PORTLAND MEN ON STAND IN DOUGLAS FIR PROBE

PORTLAND, Ore., April 17.—Denial of charges that there was a combine to force up lumber prices was made today on the witness stand by Portland lumbermen during the hearing of the conspiracy charge against the Douglas Fir Exploitation and Export company. The hearing is being conducted by E. W. Shepard, examiner for the federal trade commission.

The hearing was a continuation of the case commenced several months ago and which has been in session in Seattle for the last few weeks. Today's testimony dealt with the company's activities in the domestic market.

C. L. Lindner of the Henry Davis Lumber company, A. W. Miller of the George T. Mickle Lumber company and H. J. Anderson of the Anderson Lumber company,

denied on the stand that there was any price combining among the mills of the west coast towns and that as far as they knew there existed no set scale of prices.
