RUTH CRACKS OUT HOMER

YANKEE SLUGGER'S CIRCUIT
SWAT CINCHES GAME

(By The Associated Press)

NEW YORK, April 18.—Babe Ruth came back into his own today. When the mighty Yankee slugger cracked his first home run of the season, far into the right field bleachers of the massive new Yankee stadium, 74,200 howling fans, the largest throng that ever attended a baseball game, rose to accord the idol a thunderous ovation. Ruth's circuit clout, clinching victory for the American league champions in their opening game, with the Boston Red Sox, added the one touch needed to complete the most picturesque drama in diamond annals. The Babe, those thousands agreed, had come back. A super-world's series atmosphere pervaded the formal dedication of the huge new home of the Yankees. The record crowd, which jammed every nook and corner of the huge triple-decked grandstand and packed all but a few corners of the bleacher sections, far exceeded expectations. Every seat in the mammoth structure could have been filled, but several thousand chose to stand in the aisles rather than perch in the few vacant areas of the bleachers.

The attendance bettered by more than 30,000 the previous high mark of 42,620 set at Braves field, Boston in 1916 in a world series game between the Red Sox and Brooklyn.
