NATIONAL CHARTER IS GIVEN TO LOCAL ROTARY

District Governor Is Here
For Presentation
IS "BABY ORGANIZATION"

Order Now Has Nearly 1200 Units
—100 Members Attend Banquet
at Osburn Last Night

In the presence of over 100 members of the Rotary clubs of several cities of Oregon, the official presentation of the national charter of the recently organized Eugene club was made last evening at a banquet and meeting held at the Osburn hotel. Frank H. Lamb, of Washington, district governor of the Rotary clubs of Oregon, Washington and British Columbia, was here as the representative of the international organization and welcomed the "baby Rotary" club of the world to the parent group of nearly 1200 units of the order. R. A. Booth, president of the Eugene club, presided at the meeting, and many of the officers of the visiting clubs also were on the speaking program.

R. A. Booth Tells of Service. Mr. Booth, in addressing the Rotarians, spoke of the spirit and service that is the basis of the order and the aims and ideals that are embodied in its program of progress and development. Many telegrams from other Rotary clubs of the Northwest district were sent in greeting to the Eugene unit. Over 100 tulip bulbs were sent here by W. C. Franklin, of the Salem Rotary club and they were used as table decorations and also brought over the "Rotary Lady," the daily dressed doll that is held by the "baby club" of the district until a new club is organized. John Goss was the official spokesman for the Marshfield Rotarians at the presentation.

The banquet and presentation ceremony was held in the Palm room of the Osburn, which was artistically decorated with the colors of Rotary and the flags of 26 nations who the Rotarians of the order have been established. A huge electric lighted wheel, the symbol of the Rotarians, was suspended above the banquet board. Delegations of the Rotarians from Roseburg, McMinnville, Portland, Marshfield, Salem and Hillsboro, in addition to several visiting members of the order from other cities, were present as the guests of the Eugene members, and they added their congratulations to the members of the "baby" unit.

District Governor Entertained. The district governor arrived here yesterday before noon and was entertained at a luncheon meeting held at the Osburn hotel, where he addressed the Eugene Rotarians prior to the charter presentation held in the evening. A musical program, with John Stiefert, of the University of Oregon school of music, as the vocal soloist, was held at the noon meeting. A program of song and music was also featured at the evening session. John Stark Evans, of the U. of O. school of music, was in charge of the arrangements. A committee composed of Carl G. Washburne, John Landis and Bruce B. Brundage had charge of the details of the gathering and arranged for the decoration of the dining room for the occasion.

BACK ALIMONY SUED FOR

NELLIE HARD BRINGS ACTION
AGAINST FORMER HUSBAND

L. S. Whitestone, local dentist, is Defendant—Other Cases Filed in Court

Nellie Hard yesterday began suit in circuit court against her former husband, L. S. Whitestone, a Eugene dentist, who has just sold out here, seeking to recover the sum of \$225 alleged due as alimony. The plaintiff alleges in her complaint that she was divorced January 30, 1923, and that the court ordered him to pay \$75 alimony at that time and \$75 every month thereafter, but that he has failed to make his payments.

Walter B. Jones yesterday began suit against H. E. Owen seeking a judgment in the sum of \$50 alleged due on a promissory note together with interest at eight per cent per annum from July 15, 1921, and \$25 attorney fees.

W. M. Able yesterday sued Edward L. and Leona Marshfield for the sum of \$151.96 alleged due for goods sold to them by the plaintiff, together with interest at the rate of six per cent from April 8, 1921. Young and Ray appear as attorneys for the plaintiff.

UP-RIVER FARMER IN JAIL

WILLIAM STODDARD CHARGED
WITH INSULTY

William Stoddard, a farmer living at Hendricks bridge on the McKenzie river and near Walter-

ville, was arrested yesterday on an insanity charge and placed in jail. The officers expressed the opinion that Stoddard is not insane and that his arrest is the result of a neighborhood row.

Stoddard has threatened to kill his wife and a number of neighbors. Sheriff Stickels has been told, and complaints have been coming in about his actions for several weeks past. District Attorney Johnston and deputy sheriffs have visited Stoddard's place a number of times to investigate such reports and finally it was decided to arrest him and determine whether or not he is insane.

FRUIT PROSPECTS GOOD

CHERRIES AND PRUNES TO
BEAR HEAVILY BELIEF

Prospects are bright for good crops of cherries and prunes in Lake county this year, said C. E. Stewart, county fruit inspector, who is here from his home at Colgate Grove for a day or two.

"Cherries and prunes have set a crop," said the inspector. "Most of the trees have their blossoms already, which is a good sign. When the trees do not stay in bloom long at a time, it is an indication that fruit will form."

The inspector said that Bartlett pears have also set a crop but it is too early yet to tell what other fruits will do.

INSPECTION TO BE HELD

ARMY OFFICERS COMING TO U.
OF O. TODAY

R. O. T. C. Unit Making Extensive
Preparations for Big Event
Beginning at 1:30

Everything is ready at the R. O. T. C. barracks at the university for the inspection of a distinguished visiting recommendation this afternoon, stated Colonel W. B. Sinclair, commandant, yesterday. Cadets have been drilling extra time in preparation for the event which will be under the direction of Majors H. T. Bull and Ralph W. Kingman, of Washington, D. C.

Colonel Sinclair has also extended an invitation to all students, faculty and townspeople to be present to witness the inspection and military maneuvers during the afternoon. "This is an important event for the Oregon R. O. T. C. unit," said the colonel, "and I am sure the university will find the same Oregon spirit present at this inspection that so marks Oregon's athletic contests."

Starting with a parade and inspection at 1:30, the cadets will go through a series of drill, calisthenics, tent pitching, bayonet work, and other forms of military work. At 2:30 the field will be divided into four sectors, which will be occupied by the different companies.

BRANCH OFFICE TO OPEN

UNDERWOOD CONCERN TO
HAVE REPRESENTATIVE

To make arrangements for the establishment of a distribution branch of the Underwood Typewriter company in this city, representatives of the concern arrived here yesterday. A permanent salesman and service man is to be appointed for the local office in charge of the present plan of a visiting representative. The company has had quarters in the Zumwalt building at Seventh avenue east and Willamette street but to make way for other tenants the place is being vacated. Efforts are being made to obtain ground floor space in the business district for the new office, according to F. G. Fink, manager of the Portland office of the company, who is here to start the new agency.

W. D. Stevens will be in charge of the Eugene office of the concern. J. N. Schoen, headquarters representative of the Underwood company of New York, is here in the interests of the new local branch.

PROCTOR NAMED CAPTAIN

COTTAGE GROVE GUARD COM-
PANY ELECTS COMMANDER

First Lieutenant George A. Proctor, of Company D, 16th infantry, Oregon national guard, of Cottage Grove, was elected captain of the company and installed at a meeting of the organization held last night. The new captain has appointed Second Lieutenant Milne to the rank of first lieutenant and First Sergeant Lombard to the rank of second lieutenant. Captain Proctor fills the vacancy in the company as the result of the resignation of Captain Claude C. Crisman, who resigned owing to lack of time to devote to the affairs of the organization.

About 60 of the men of the company were present at the election and inspection. Adjutant General George A. White, commander of the national guard of Oregon, Captain Thomas E. Rilea, 162nd infantry, and Major Eugene Libby, commander of the first battalion of the 18th infantry, Major J. Schur and Captain Rufus Boylan, United States army, were present for the meeting. Major Schur will remain over in Cottage Grove today to assist in the transfer of the company property to the new commander.

SENT UP FOR VAGRANCY

WILLIAM WALKER ADMITS
USING DRUGS

A young man giving the name of William Walker was sentenced by Judge Jesse G. Wells, of the justice court, yesterday afternoon to serve two months in the county jail for vagrancy. District Attorney Johnston said that he would be sent to the rock pile at Rattlesnake butte.

Walker, who gave the officers two other names before he finally settled on this one, was found loafing about the S. P. yards yesterday forenoon. He was ordered off the premises but refused to go and became quite saucy about it, the officers said. He was questioned in the office of Sheriff Stickels for an hour or more. Walker said that he had been addicted to the use of drugs but that he had quit it some time ago. He said that he had been an inmate of an industrial school for boys in his younger days and that he has served in several jails for vagrancy. He says he has a mother in Vancouver, Wash., but that he was adopted by another woman and her husband when he was a year and a half old.

LANE HIGHWAY CONTRACT WILL BE GIVEN IN LUMP

Bids on Blachly-Rainrock
Work Must Be on Entire Job
SMALL BIDDERS LET OUT

Notice to Contractors for Surface-
ing 7.9 Miles of McKenzie
Section Received

The entire work of building the 24 miles of the Willamette Valley-Florence highway between Blachly and Rainrock, down Lake creek and the Blachly river, must be done under one contract, according to word received at the office of Ralph S. Shelley, supervisor of the Blachly national forest, from Philip H. Bator, district engineer of the forest service in Portland.

A number of local contractors had contemplated bidding on small portions of the job, said Mr. Shelley. This order, however, will preclude most of them because there are not many men or firms in this part of the state with equipment enough to undertake a 24-mile grading and macadamizing job through mountainous territory.

Bids to be opened May 8 at the office of the bureau of public roads in Portland May 8, according to notice received here. The notice to contractors sent out by the bureau states that the work includes that of grading of 5.4 miles of right-of-way, 82,000 cubic yards of rock excavation, 122,000 cubic yards of common excavation, 250 yards of class A concrete, 22,000 pounds of reinforcing steel, 16 miles of surfacing of 6-inch drain tile and 1000 feet of guard rail.

According to the notice the contract must be completed in 240 working days from the time the contract is signed.

McKenzie Job to Be Let. Officials of the Cascade national forest yesterday received notice that the bids on 7.9 miles of surfacing of the McKenzie highway just above Belknap springs will be opened by the bureau of public roads in Portland May 8, the surfacing to be of gravel or crushed rock. This work is to be completed within 120 working days from the time the contract is signed, according to the notice.

INSPECTION OF ORCHARDS
NEAR HERE TO BE MADE

Stewart, county fruit inspector, came down from Cottage Grove yesterday to meet B. B. Patton, entomologist at the Oregon Agricultural college, and they will make the inspection together.

Mr. Stewart has already made an inspection of trees in the Creswell and Cloverdale district and said he was unable to find any thrips. The inspection is made at the request of the state horticultural commissioner at Salem.
