After dropping the opener on Monday to the visiting Idaho Vandals the Oregon baseball team came back strong yesterday afternoon and trounced the invading aggregation by a 13-7 score. Besides having a heavy day with the club, Oregon played great ball in the field and but one error was chalked up against their fielding, which is something of an occurrence in college ball. Tiny Shields pitched the variety to victory and although he appeared to be headed for the showers in the seventh and ninth frames, he weathered the fustillade of hits made off his offerings and came through chalked up with a victory in his first college game.

Four Run Lead Obtained

The Webfooters opened their scoring activities in their half of the second when a combination of Oregon bingles and Idaho errors gave the variety four runs. Golden, the Vandals' moundmen, got himself in the hole when he hit Wright the first man up on the fingers. Then Soraby singled to right, Shafer sacrificed and Wright scored on Latham's bingle to center. Latham and Soraby crossed the pan a minute later when Fitzke, Idaho center fielder muffed up Cooks single to deep center. Cook scored on a hit by Ross and Roycroft went out Golden to Golden when he attempted to bunt, retiring the side.

Oregon pushed three more counters across the pan in the third on a combination of two glaring errors and three hits. In their half of the fourth when a walk, a hit and a bevy of errors contributed three runs, Oregon scored again. One run in the fifth and two in the sixth made mainly on Idaho's boots completed the Oregon scoring.

Through the opening six innings Tiny Shields had the Argonauts eating out of his hand, but in the first of the seventh, incidentally it was in the seventh on Monday that Idaho came from behind and took over the contest, with two away the fireworks started and when the smoke had cleared away Idaho had pushed four counters over the rubber. The Vandals ushered three more muffed scores, the plate in the first of the ninth in a desperate attempt to convert the defeat into victory. The Gem-staters looked dangerous in the last frame the inning opened with Ross retiring Fitzke on a beautiful play of a slashing grounder but the next man up for Idaho singled and crossed the plate when Lawson, Idaho third-sacker doubled. Marreau batting for Kline singled and crossed the plate, preceded by Lawson when Slivers the Vandals' diminutive short patch guardian, rapped out a long triple. Then with things looking bad for the Webfooters Tiny Shields tightened his belt and retired the side by striking out Kieffner.

The Oregon defense weathered all storms yesterday and came through soaked safely, heavy squalls without cracking. Jimmy Ross shifted over to shortstop from second base looked good in that position and handled every chance without a bobble. The little shortstop also had a good day with the hickory and cracked out three hits in five times up. Shafer, who took over Jimmy's duties at the keystone sack played a nice game and though he was credited with the error bobbles made by the variety it was on a difficult play.
