2 AMENDMENTS ADOPTED

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT BODY
CHOOSES ELECTION TIME
Changes in Constitution Are Made
To Clarify Future Proceedings
and Social Activities

(Register Lane County Special)
SPRINGFIELD, Ore., April 25.—Two amendments to the Springfield high school student body constitution were adopted at a meeting of the students held yesterday in the high school auditorium. Both amendments were proposed by the civic class, which is under the charge of Professor F. M. Roth. The amendments follow:

"Amendment article one: The time and place and manner of holding elections of the student council shall be left to each of the four classes of the school, but the officers of the student body for the student council shall be nominated by the direct primary nominating method on the first Monday in May by the student body, and elections of said officers held one week later.

"Article seven, section one. Amendments to this constitution may be proposed at any time by some organized responsible body.

"Section two. All proposed amendments shall be posted in some conspicuous place at least seven days before voting on the amendment.

"Section three. All proposed amendments must pass by two-thirds majority of the student body before becoming part of the constitution.

"Section four. All voting on proposed amendments shall be by ballot.

"Section five. By organized or responsible bodies is meant regular organized class groups."

Another amendment which was sponsored by Principal J. E. Torbett and adopted by the student body was as follows:

"An amendment article five, section five. All entertainments shall be announced and posted on the school bulletin not less than five days prior to the holding of said entertainments said notice to contain the name of the sponsor and the name of at least one of the faculty."

Nomination of student body officers will take place in the near future and election will be held before the close of school.

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., April 25.—Three parties of tourists, all from outside the state, are now camped on the local auto tourist grounds. Two of the parties will probably remain here, while the third is on his way to Albany.

Axel Morlin and wife have come here from Spokane and will stay at the camp until they find a suitable home. Mr. Morlin will go to work at once leading lumber by contract for the Booth-Kelly Lumber company. They report a pleasant trip from the north and have expressed a real liking for the country around here.

DAILY MARKET REPORT

OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE
PORTLAND, Ore., April 25.—Market for eggs continues to show strength here despite all talk of approaching disaster. The trade appears unable to fathom the existing strong demand, although there are none who are able to say that the demand is not here.

Selling prices on select eggs has been advanced to as high as 28c a dozen by some of the leading private firms, a rise of 2c from previous figures. While as high as 30c is quoted for storage pack, the price is not a fresh egg market factor as some of the stock goes into the fresh egg trade. Storage pack always brings a premium of 2c to 3c a dozen above what is commonly called select stock.

ONION TRADE IS VERY SLACK
Trade in the onion market is very slow at this time, there being practically no apple sales, while the association is nominally holding for \$2 per cental. Much No. 2 stock is coming on the market here.

ASPARAGUS PRICES ARE EASY
With some of the shippers putting out bunches that weigh only 3-4 pound, the market for asparagus is easier with sales from \$2 to \$2.50 per dozen. Some fancy pound bunches sold at the extreme.

REPORTS APPLES CLEANING UP
According to John Sheridan of the Sheridan Fruit & Produce company, just returned from a trip through the Yakima district, that section is cleaning up its apple supplies and is today asking more money than the trade here will pay. Firmer prices are also asked by Columbia river sections for best quality.
