

OREGON STUDENT BODY ROUSED AT BOHLER AFFAIR

Services of Coach Too Valuable to Lose Is Opinion

DOES MUCH FOR SPORTS

One of Accomplishments Is the Elimination of Raging of Opposing Players and Officials

The announcement that George Bohler will not be on the campus next year has roused the Oregon student body in general and members of the order of the O, which is composed of all Oregon lettermen. The opinion is advanced

freely by both athletic and non-athletic students that Bohler is too valuable a man to lose if it is possible to keep him.

The fact that his application for next year would not be counter-signed by Dean Howard was made public by Coach Bohler Wednesday evening following a conference with the dean. This refusal to recommend practically amounts to a dismissal since members of the faculty of a given school or department are never elected by the board of regents save on the recommendation of the dean.

Action Anticipated
This action was anticipated by close followers of the athletic situation at Oregon since there has been marked friction between Coach Bohler and Dean Howard for the last two years. The direct charge as given out by Coach Bohler was the general one of lack of the fullest co-operation with the department. Much the same situation arose a year ago when Bohler was about to turn in his resignation but was averted by prompt action of the lettermen who stood behind him almost to a man.

Practically every student who has voiced an opinion held that Bohler should be retained at all hazards. Just what will be done by the students toward retaining their coach is uncertain but the fact remains that they all want

him and feel that Oregon loses if he goes.

Bohler Is Out
One of the accomplishments of Bohler's career at Oregon is in evidence every time there is an athletic contest, especially a baseball or basketball game where the crowds are small, intensely partisan and near the players, and that is the fact that there is no more razzing of opposing players and seldom an official. A few years ago that was not the case and Oregon baseball teams have often been razzed by their own supporters. A few years ago many college teams hated to come to Oregon to play because of the reception they received but now all the teams enjoy playing here because of the treatment accorded. In fact while Coach Bohler was in the north refereeing the Idaho-California-Idaho championship game he was told by California players, "You fellows must be the champions in the north next year; we'd like to play the series in Eugene."

Plans Are Uncertain
Bohler's plans for the future are uncertain. There is, of course, a bare possibility that he will remain at Oregon but that seems rather unlikely for though the students are strong for him and the prospects next year are for almost sure championships in baseball and basketball he does not care to remain here while present conditions obtain. Certainly he will not be begging for a job in his certain field and several colleges in the Northwest are known to be negotiating for his services. The school that succeeds in landing him will secure a real coach and gentleman.

The question of Bohler's leaving is of such importance to the Oregon students that it furnished the topic for conversation on every street corner overshadowing the coming student body elections which generally fill the foreground of student consciousness about this time of year.

F. J. HENRY IS ACCUSED
CHARGED WITH DEBAUCHING TWO OF RELATIVES

SAN JOSE, Cal., April 26.—Francis J. Henry, former prosecutor in the Oregon timber fraud and San Francisco graft cases, was charged today with having debauched his sister-in-law, Mrs. Mary A. Henry, and his nephew, Edwin A. Henry, out of title to the vineyard, the Chateau Ricardo in Santa Clara county, Cal., valued at \$250,000. The charge was made in an answer to an ejectment suit filed in the superior court.

The plaintiffs allege in the answer that Henry while acting as their attorney in the renewal of a \$40,000 mortgage on the property, bought the vineyard in his own name, and then filed the ejectment suit. The answer also set forth that he borrowed \$40,000 from a San Francisco bank against the property, thereby gaining title for himself.

The plaintiffs further aver that they have owned and developed the land since 1882 and ask that the foreclosure proceedings be set aside and the property be returned to them.

NAWSCO SHIP ON ROCKS
CHANCE TO SALVAGE "BRUSH" OFF COOS BAY, BELIEF

MARSHFIELD, Ore., April 26.—The Nawasco line freighter, Brush, which struck on the point off Cape Arago reef, three miles south of Coos bay at four o'clock this morning, was pierced amidships, according to her officers, who with the crew were landed this afternoon. The craft hung on the rock and it was believed there is a possibility of salvaging her. Captain C. G. Mitchell, who was accompanied by Mrs. Mitchell on the trip, forwarded word to Nawasco line agents at San Francisco that in the event of smooth weather the Brush would probably remain in place until large tugs and apparatus could be sent from San Francisco and permit of considerable salvaging.

The winning run coming in the ninth on a double by Harris and a single by Burras after New York had tied the score in the final inning. More than 20,000 fans, the largest opening day crowd in ten years, watched Frank Chance make his debut as manager of the Red Sox.

WASHINGTON, April 26.—Twenty-two thousand fans saw Washington take the opening game of the season here today from Philadelphia, 2 to 1. With the score tied in the seventh, Zachary, who pitched the Nationals to victory, hit for three bases, only to be put out later at the plate. Evans, however, scored during the inning on a single by Goslin.

CHICAGO, April 26.—Stanley Coveleskie pitched airtight ball in the pitcher's today while Cleveland's Bill Faber opportunely and shut out Chicago 5 to 0 before an opening day crowd of approximately 30,000. In the first inning the Indians bunched three hits with a base on balls and jumped into a run lead. Wamby's double, a sacrifice and a single netted them the other run.
