SPRINGFIELD, Ore., April 27.—
Construction of the bleachers
for the Springfield baseball field
has started. They will be ready
for the game Sunday between the
local nine and Wendling, accord-
ing to D. W. McKinnon, secretary
of the club. The grounds have
been carefully leveled, and with
the completion of the stands, the
city will have one of the neatest
ball parks in the valley, according
to those in charge.

That baseball is attracting a
great deal of interest here is shown
by the increasing number of fans
turning out for nightly practice
on the field at Fifth street. "We
are glad to see the excellent turn-
out of players, out of which we
hope to form a championship
team," states W. B. Champwright,
manager of the club. "and we
wish the people of Springfield to
feel free to come out at any time
and watch the boys work out."

Support Is Promised

The various civic organizations
and clubs of the city are all back-
ing the team to the limit, and
promise their support in the ven-
ture. The Loyal Legion of Log-
gers and Lumbermen have agreed
to take care of the forfeit that
must be posted by the team to in-
sure its membership in the Upper
Willamette Valley league, and has
also promised to assist in any other
way that might be necessary.

The season for the league will

open officially Sunday, May 13,
with the local team meeting the
Eugene squad in Eugene at the
fair grounds diamond. Because
of the proximity of Eugene, a
large turnout of Springfield sup-
porters is expected to be on hand
at the opening contest.

the local field Sunday, May 20.
