APRIL WEATHER WARMER THIS YEAR THAN USUAL

Mean Temperature During Month 51 Degrees

AVERAGE HAS BEEN 49.9

Maximum 83 on 15th and Minimum 35 on Three Different Dates

—Rainfall Is 2.96 Inches

April this year was warmer than usual, according to the report of Lee Goetschius, Eugene weather observer. The mean temperature was 51 while the average mean for the month during the past seven years has been 49.9 degrees.

The maximum temperature was 83 degrees on the 15th and the minimum was 35 on the 9th, 13th and 21st. The total rainfall was 2.96 inches. There was no snow-fall. There were only 9 clear days during the month. All the rest were cloudy. There were no frosts and no sleet but there was thunder on the first and second. The prevailing direction of the wind was from the northwest.

The weather man says that the average stage of the river at Eugene for April during the past eight years has been 5.4 feet but that year it was 4.8 feet.

CITY BIDS ARE OPENED

POWER PLANT IMPROVEMENTS ARE TO START

No Action Is Taken But Further Consideration of Contracts Is to Be Made, Is Report

Bids on widening the tailrace and the canal of the Eugene municipal power plant at Waltherville were opened and discussed at a meeting of the water board last night, but no action was taken as a further consideration of the bids is to be made, according to C. A. McClain, superintendent of public utilities. The work will consist of about one-half mile on the tailrace and about three and one-half miles of the canal. All bids were submitted by the contractors calling for the completion of the work before December 31, this year. There was a wide range of bids submitted, the low figure being \$55,727, and the top price for the work was \$148,531.

The improvements to the city power plant will provide for the third unit of the plant. The bids for the construction were received from firms at Portland, Seattle, Boise, Spokane and Snell, California. The following were the concerns and the amount bid: Morrison-Knudsen company, Boise, Idaho, \$55,727; General Construction company, Spokane, \$59,535; E. J. Chisholm and Sons, Spokane, \$63,871; Monson-Trierweiler company, Portland, \$74,678; Puget Sound Bridge and Dredging company, Seattle, \$81,445; Montague company, O'Leary, \$81,029; Johnson Contract company, Portland, \$94,515; C. R. Adams, Snell, California, \$99,430; Greenwood and Dann, Portland, \$148,531.

ARMY STORE WILL MOVE

LEASE IS TAKEN ON NINTH AVENUE LOCATION

Hub Clothing and Shoe Store to Take Willamette Street Quarters Vacated by Firm

Leasing of the store on Ninth avenue east now occupied by the People's Cash store and the moving of the Hub clothing and shoe store from its present place at Eighth avenue west and Olive street to the Willamette street establishment which is to be vacated by the army store, has been announced with the completion last night of details of the transfer of the two business establishments. R. S. Barrett, floor manager of the Hub store, and the partner store, has become associated with George E. Love, proprietor of the Surplus Army Goods store, and plans are under way for the opening of a modern department store when the new firm takes over the quarters of the Peoples store on May 21.

A lease for a term of years has been taken by the new firm of Love and Barrett on the Ninth avenue location and the fixtures have been purchased from the Peoples Cash store which is now closing out the present stock. An entire new stock of wearing apparel and furnishings will be provided for the new establishment, according to members of the firm. The interior of the store will be extensively renovated in preparation for the opening which is expected to take place about the latter part of the month, is the announcement.

The Surplus Army Goods store was established in this city at the Hampton building on Sixth avenue west and Willamette street in December, 1920, and the following June the store was moved to its present quarters on Willamette street between Sixth and Seventh avenues. A constantly increasing business since the store was opened has resulted in the plan to obtain larger selling facilities in the business district, according to Mr. Love. In addition to the general merchandise to be handled by the new store, the army goods department will be maintained.

The Hub clothing and shoe store was established at Eighth avenue and Olive street about three years ago by F. C. Pursley who was formerly in business for nine years in the Coos bay district. The new location will be refitted and a new front installed when the place is taken over on the removal of the Army Goods store, according to Mr. Pursley.
