RUM FLEET SCURRIES AT APPROACH OF U.S. CUTTER

JERSEY COAST CLEARED OF GROC FREEBOATERS
Trucker Warszawa and Yacht Lstar Steam Out to Sea When Chased By Federal Scout

(By The Associated Press)
HIGHLANDS, N. J., May 2.—A general exodus of the rum fleet that has been off the New Jersey coast for several months began late today when the British tanker Warszawa and the yacht Lstar got up steam and sailed out to sea. Both were out of sight before dark. The vessels disappeared soon after a government cutter had hailed and searched a small unidentified steamer that was steaming towards the fleet. When the cutter headed back towards Rum Row, the tanker Warszawa, which had been on the row since February, steamed out to sea on a northwest course. The Lstar followed a few minutes later, headed southeast.

Great activity was manifested through the whole fleet, consisting of the tanker, the yacht, a small steamer, and four schooners, late today. Smoke was pouring from the stacks of the tanker and the Lstar for some time before they fled at the approach of the cutter.

Other members of the fleet showed signs of departure and it was believed they would scuttle out to sea either to return to their ports or to another anchorage spot under cover of darkness. The Lstar had been on the row since January, and with the Warszawa, was believed to have disposed of the greater part of the cargo of liquor.

Much excitement was caused among the shore runners by the departures which evidently were unexpected. They believed that a new wave of operations would be established.

The note stresses the difficulty of arriving at a tangible basis for computing Germany's economic and financial capacity in her present situation and it declares every solution must be sufficiently elastic to take this condition into consideration.

OWN RESOURCES NOT ADEQUATE
It should furthermore be noted, says the document, that Germany, owing to the lack of surplus profits from her own products will in the near future be unable to raise any large amounts of capital from her own resources and that consequently she needs foreign loans, which, however, can

CHIHUAHUA CITY, May 2.—Protesting the execution of eight labor leaders in Chicago May 1, 1886, resulting from the Haymarket riots, 500 members of the State Federation of Labor, here
