JACOB HILEMAN, AGED 82, LIVED NEAR MABEL 32 YEARS

(Register Lane County Special) SPRINGFIELD, Ore., May 4.—Jacob Hileman, a resident of the Mabel district for 32 years, died yesterday at his home at the age of 82 years, four months and 24 days. He is survived by children, and by 12 great-grandchildren. It is not known how many grandchildren survive him.

Mr. Hileman was born in Illinois December 9, 1840, and came to Oregon 32 years ago. He settled on a farm near Mabel and has resided there ever since. He was very highly esteemed in the community, and was well known in the Mabel valley as one of the early pioneers.

The funeral will be held Saturday at 2 o'clock at the church at Mabel. Reverend Ritter, of Mabel, officiating. Details of the arrangements are being cared for by W. F. Walker, undertaker, of Springfield. Interment will be in the Mabel cemetery.

AUTO KILLS GROVE BOY

CAR BACKED OVER SHELLEY KIRKLEY AT BALL GAME

(Register Lane County Special) COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., May 4.—Shelley Kirkley, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Will Kirkley, died at about 5 o'clock this afternoon, following an accident in which he was run over by an automobile driven by a group of Eugene boys who had attended a baseball game between Cottage Grove and Springfield. The child was lying on the grass face down and was not observed by Orris Page, the driver of the car.

A rear wheel passed over the boy's back as the car was leaving the field. The accident happened at about 4:30 o'clock, and the lad an only child, died within half an hour of an internal hemorrhage. Immediately after he was run over the boy got up saying that he was not hurt much. He was rushed to the office of a physician where he died.

Orris Page is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Page, 277 Fifth avenue west. According to the story brought here by him and his companions he was backing the car out of the baseball grounds when the Kirkley boy was struck. He said he sounded his horn and looked back of the car but saw no one.
