STEELHEAD RUN COMING

STATE HATCHERY OFFICIAL
PREDICTS TROUT RETURN

Matt Hyckman Reports Fish Lib-
erated in McKenzie Five Years
Ago Will Be Back to Spawn

Although but very few steelhead trout have been taken from the Lane county rivers during the past few years there will probably be a run of these species this year, according to Matt Hyckman, superintendent of state trout hatcheries, who bases his prediction on the theory that the steelhead will return to the stream where it was liberated at the end of a five-year period. The state official says that five years ago a large number of the steelheads were turned into the McKenzie river, and that if the fish abide by the habits that have prevailed according to the records of the hatchery officials the run that was liberated at that time will be back here to spawn this year.

The return of the steelhead to the waters where it was first liberated has been checked up by numerous experiments of the fish officials, according to Hyckman. Many fish have been tagged when liberated and it has been found that the run will return at the end of five years. Some of the fish have been found that have returned in three years and the return of a run in seven years has been noted but the five-year mark is sound by the state hatchery men to be the time that the steelheads can be expected.

Last year several anglers reported that steelheads of 15 and 16 inches were caught in the waters of the Willamette and McKenzie but the number was small. This year Hyckman reports that if the fish run true to form that steelhead fishing will be available for the Lane county anglers.

PIG PRIZE IS OFFERED

1—Pigs must be farrowed on or after March 1, 1923.
2—Pigs must be out of a record-ed sire and dam.
3—No exhibitor will be allowed to win more than one county fair trophy in one year offered by this association.
4—Before the prize is delivered to the successful exhibitor the name and record number of the sire and date of the litter date of farrow of the litter and the name and address of the exhibitor winning the prize must be sent to the secretary of this association.
5—This prize will not be awarded unless there are at least two exhibitors exhibiting for the same.

CAREFUL IN DRY MOVES

CAUTION MARKS ADMINISTRATION'S NEW POLICY

WASHINGTON, May 4.—The administration is moving with extreme caution in its preparations to apply the supreme court liquor edict against the foreign vessels in American ports and the regulations now in the making will not be announced until every possible angle of the situation has been examined. 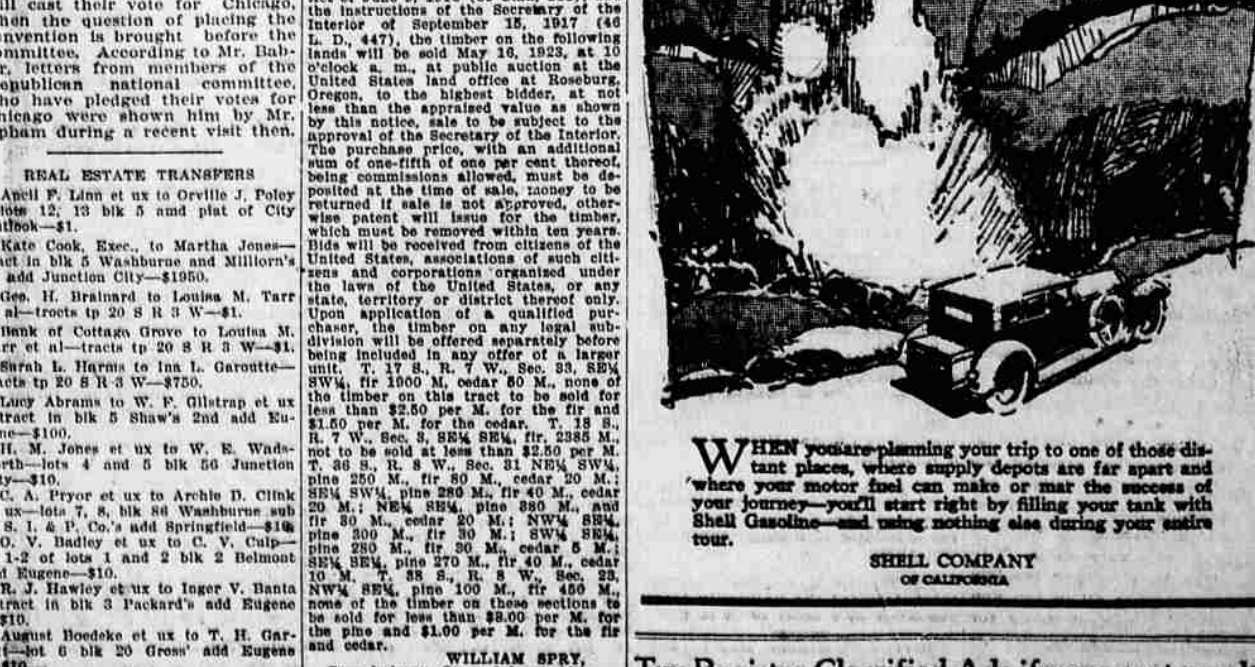
