SPRINGFIELD OPPOSED TO MERGER OF CITIES

No Benefit Seen in Union With Eugene at Present
INDEPENDENCE DESIRED

Belief in Industrial Prosperity of Community Without Outside Help is Expressed

(Register Lane County Special)
SPRINGFIELD, Ore., May 5.—Springfield would derive no real benefit from the proposed merger of this city and Eugene, nor would the combining of the two communities be of any especial advantage to residents or property owners, is the opinion of leading business men and officials of the city and civic organizations.

The project, which is sponsored by Eugene real estate men, is understood to be an incorporation of Springfield, the territory between here and Eugene and Eugene into one city with Eugene as the business and residential district, and Springfield as the industrial community. It has been said that this move would raise property values between the two cities, and would give Eugene prestige as the second largest city in the state.

Many residents of Springfield, however, do not believe that this prestige and the possible increase in property values outside their city limits could offset the heavy expense that would be required to dig the river and make the land attractive for home sites, and the added financial burden of keeping up the road, building new streets and the construction of a much-needed new highway bridge over the new waterway.

No Advantages Seen
"I can see no advantages," for Springfield in this combination," said W. F. Walker, local undertaker and president of the Springfield chamber of commerce. "This city has been prominent in the past, and it is also highly probable that the railroad car shops will be built here also. We face a period of industrial prosperity of our own and we are prepared to forge ahead on our own initiative. To become a part of Eugene would take away our individuality, besides piling on our shoulders a financial burden from which we would derive little benefit."

Another phase of the situation is expressed by Mayor E. C. Eggerman. "Springfield would at most have but one representative on the city council, which would give us but little say in the administration of our own community. This city has separate interests and separate problems, with which we alone feel capable to handle."

J. W. Coffin, city judge, can see nothing to be gained in the way of civic improvements by the merger. "Our destinies would be guided by a set of men who would be unfamiliar with conditions here," he said, "and since the two communities are separated by a natural barrier, there would be no way to arise. Then, too, politics would become a real problem that might not work out to our satisfaction."

Plan Held Impracticable
The plan is impracticable because Springfield people are loyal to their city, and are thoroughly imbued with genuine civic pride, is the opinion of Oswald Olson, head of the American Legion and prominent in lodge work. "We all believe that a period of prosperity is here and we can enjoy it without any outside help."

Other prominent men of the city have expressed themselves as against any move for a merger and cite as a mark of their industrial and civic independence the many industries and enterprises of the city. Springfield has at present the lumber plant of the Lumbers Lumber company, Booth-Kelly Lumber company, known as one of the most complete lumber manufacturing mills on the Pacific coast; the Mountain States Power company, which is amply able to supply power to the city and surrounding country; the Hosiery Lumber Products company; the Carbolignum processing plant; grocery, department, drug, furniture and hardware stores; restaurants, bakeries, hotels, a newspaper and all other establishments needed to care for the needs of a community and to give plenty of remunerative work to its inhabitants.

The time may come when the two cities may naturally grow together, but until they do, it will not benefit Springfield to cast off its own identity and individuality, is the opinion expressed by almost everyone approached on the subject.

FARMERS NEAR SPRINGFIELD OPTIMISTIC IS REPORT

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., May 5.—That crops will be the best in years this season is the opinion of F. A. Clingan, proprietor of the Morrison and Clingan seed store of this city. Mr. Clingan bases his prediction not only on the fact that seed buying has been very heavy this year, but on the optimism expressed by the farmers, whom he meets every day.

"The farmers of this section are not only well pleased with crop prospects, but are enthusiastic over the season," he says. "All grain crops are reported as coming along nicely, and fruit looks better this year than for several seasons. Unless a drought hits the valley, I predict a very successful harvest."

Mr. Clingan also states that dairymen and others are taking greater interest in scientific methods of raising stock and cultivating their ground this year. He reports that the call for good seed and for the better brands of stock food has been very heavy this spring.
