BLAST ENTOMBS MINERS

THREE BODIES RECOVERED OF 10 MEN MISSING

TRINIDAD, Colo., May 5.—Three bodies had been recovered, and seven checked as missing in the explosion which wrecked north slope of the Southwestern mine of the Rocky Mountain Fuel company at Southwestern Camp near Aguilar early tonight, which increased the number of men entombed by the explosion to ten.

Reports from the mine said the belief is strengthened by conditions encountered by the rescue crews that all in the mine have perished. Several of the rescuers were overcome with gas.

That the explosion was caused by a set-off of gas was stated at the mine office. The north slope was badly wrecked. Between 45 and 70 men are normally employed in the mine on regular working days but today was an idle day and only 12 men were in the workings cleaning up some leads.

'DIRT FARMER' IS NAMED

E. H. CUNNINGHAM APPOINTED TO RESERVE BOARD

WASHINGTON, May 5.—Edward H. Cunningham, of Iowa, was appointed by President Harding today to the "dirt" farmer member of the federal reserve board. The President also announced the appointment of Edward E. Jones of Pennsylvania, to be the additional member of the farm loan board, authorized under the new agricultural credits legislation.

Mr. Cunningham, who was appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the death several weeks ago of Milo D. Campbell, owns and operates a farm in Iowa and is secretary of the Iowa farm bureau federation. He served six years in the Iowa legislature and for two terms was speaker of the house.

Mr. Jones is a Republican, has been a member of the Pennsylvania legislature for many years and at present is serving as treasurer of the federal land bank at Baltimore.

ATTORNEYS PROPOSE TO TILT LEGAL STANDARDS

COLLEGE DIPLOMA WOULD BE REQUIRED IN OREGON

Vice-Presidents Elected at Portland Meet Include Frank W. Calkins, G. F. Skipworth

PORTLAND, Ore., May 5.—The initial step to make the legal profession in Oregon one entirely of college graduates was taken by the State Bar association at its first convention session. As the culmination of a move to raise the standards of their profession the lawyers endorsed a memorial to the supreme court asking that five years of academic training be made one of the requisites for admission to the bar.

ANTI-DRY SOLON PASSES

J. W. RAINEY, OF ILLINOIS, IS VICTIM OF PNEUMONIA

CHICAGO, May 5.—John W. Rainey, Democratic congressman from the fourth Illinois district, died last night from pneumonia after an illness of two weeks.

Representative Rainey was elected to his first term in congress in 1918 to fill a vacancy in the fourth Illinois district. Subsequently he was re-elected to the 66th and 67th congresses.

He participated in national congresses of the Democratic party, stumping for former President Wilson and Governor Cox.

In congress he attracted considerable attention when he suggested the repeal of the Volstead act and proposed a \$500,000,000 liquor tax to pay the national soldier bonus.

Representative Rainey had a large following among world war veterans as, during his time in congress, he had personally taken charge of some 35,000 claims of the soldiers.
