INCOME LEVY LAW
FACES TEST IN FALL

Income levy, as are a majority of the other residents, nearly all of whom own property and desire to be relieved of taxation from that source. Working and salaried men form but a small portion of the population there, so the opposition to the measure is expected to be negligible.

Defeat of Law Predicted
Defeat of the law has been predicted in Marion county, while in Yamhill the income tax is said to have struck a popular chord and is likely to receive support. The farmers and cattle men there were reported to be strong for the measure.

A canvass of Benton county reveals a suspicion that the new levy will not provide relief from high taxes while in Malheur county it is said that the farmers have been so hard hit that they are willing to try anything. The farmers of Yamhill county are in favor of the law as they feel it will reduce the assessments on real estate and farm acreage. A writer from Sherman county declares that not one person in favor of the measure has been found. A majority of the voters in the Coos Bay district is declared to be opposed to the law. This also applies to Washington, Tillamook and Wasco counties.

KOZER VEXED BY PROBLEM
Whether Income Referendum Measures Be Printed Is Poser

SALEM, Ore., May 3.—Whether two income referendum measures against the state income tax act passed by the 1922 legislature be printed in the voters' pamphlet and in the ballot for special election in Oregon next November is a problem now before Secretary of State Koser, and which he will refer to Attorney General Van Winkle for directions as to procedure.

This developed today when the state income referendum league filed with the secretary completed referendum petitions containing 18,550 names. Earlier in the week the Oregon Just Tax league also filed completed petitions to invoke the referendum on the measure and these have been approved and filed by Secretary Koser. The petitions received Saturday will be held pending an opinion from the attorney general, the object being if possible to avoid duplicating the measures in the pamphlet and on the ballot.
