PIERCE ASKS WARDEN TO KEEP REIN ON TRUSTIES

ESCAPES TOO FREQUENT IS GOVERNOR'S CHARGE

Four More Escapes, Making Total of 21, Causes Executive to Advise Warden to Use Caution

SALEM, Ore., May 5.—Because of frequent escape of trustees from the state penitentiary recently, Governor Pierce tonight addressed a letter to Warden Johnson S. Smith, urging him to use greater caution to keep the men in custody as most of the escapes have been from the prison wood camp and the warden has used a great many trustees outside as a matter of economy. After stating in his letter that he favors the greatest economy possible at the prison, the governor in his letter adds:

"However, I had not forgotten that the penitentiary was built to keep prisoners away from society. It is, after all, a prison in which men sent there are to be kept. Although I am not greatly exercised over the few escapes that have taken place, it is my judgment that it is necessary for the warden to use greater caution to the end that further escapes will be eliminated. I therefore direct you to take immediately whatever measures are necessary to prevent further escapes from the Oregon penitentiary."

Four trustees were reported missing today, making a total of about 21 escapes and attempted escapes since January 1. Of this number five have been returned.

SALEM IS SHRINE MECCA
200 NEO-PHYTES INITIATED IN LODGE CEREMONIAL

SALEM, Ore., May 5.—As a climax of the Shrine ceremonial of Al Eader Temple, held here today, 200 neophytes were tonight initiated into the playground branch of Masonry in a ceremony at the Grand theatre. Throughout the day in parades, at dinner and at banquets the neophytes were led about with ropes and with cowbells attached. Another feature tonight is a ball at the armory. Over 2000 Shriner's gathered at 5:30 in a big warehouse for dinner, while their wives and families were entertained at dinner by local churches.

It is estimated that about 2500 members came from all parts of the state, while with their families the attendance is estimated at 4000. Salem streets are a bedlam tonight.

FLOOD GUARD PROVIDED
ADDITIONAL GAUGES PUT IN WILLAMETTE, SANTIAM

PORTLAND, Ore., May 5.—Additional flood protection has been provided for the Willamette valley as a result of a two weeks inspection trip just concluded by E. L. Wells, meteorologist in charge of the district office of the weather bureau, and F. F. Henshaw, assistant engineer of the United States geological survey.

The representatives of the government agreed upon a co-operative arrangement to exchange reports from various rainfall and water gauge stations in the valley. In addition the weather bureau made arrangements to place additional water gauges on the north Santiam, on the south Santiam, on the Middle Fork of the Willamette at Eula and on the Coast Fork of the Willamette at Saginaw. Location of several new rainfall stations was made in the valley foothills and the district office will receive telegraphic reports from these places.

FORD NOW RICHEST MAN
FORTUNE ESTIMATED TO BE OVER \$600,000,000

NEW YORK, May 5.—The "street" was generally agreed today that Henry Ford is the richest man in the world, following publication yesterday of the Ford Motor company's statement of its financial condition as of February 28, 1923, showing assets of \$536,351,920. Actual cash on hand was \$159,405,687.

The figures were revealed in a statement filed with the Massachusetts commissioner of corporations in Boston.

Wall street further estimated that the Ford fortune totals something between \$600,000,000 and \$750,000,000.

Ford is said to replace John D. Rockefeller as the world's wealthiest leader, the Rockefeller fortune being depleted to \$390,000,000 by the oil magnate's various gifts, estimated, in round numbers at \$1,000,000,000.
