

W. STRIKERS BACK AT WORK ON PACIFIC COAST

Washington Longshoremen, Loggers Return

STRIKE ON JOB ORDERED

Only Temporary in North Leaders Say—Some of the Men to Refuse Known Reds

SAN FRANCISCO, May 7.—The general strike called by the Industrial Workers of the World April 25 is about at an end in the Pacific coast states, according to reports received tonight. The loggers and longshoremen in Washington and Oregon have returned to work.

Washington Loggers Back. SEATTLE, May 7.—Loggers in the state of Washington called out on strike April 25 by I. W. W. have been directed to return to work with the further instruction that the resumption will be only temporary. I. W. W. leaders said today. Approximately 10,000 men were affected by the walkout, which forced the closing of a number of lumber camps and caused others to operate at a greatly curtailed production.

Employment agencies here that had been closed down or virtually closed down since the strike began were notified by I. W. W. headquarters that the organization's ban on posting jobs for timber workers had been lifted. They were doing a thriving business today. Hundreds of men who came to Seattle when the strike was called began leaving for the woods Saturday and the outflow continued today.

A number of the larger employers expressed their intention of refusing reinstatement to men known to be members of the I. W. W. The smaller camps began hiring new crews today, according to information here.

Strike Off Near Spokane. SPOKANE, Wash., May 7.—The strike of the Industrial Workers of the World called last week as a protest against imprisonment of wartime offenders has been called off, it was announced today by Frank Baker, chairman of the strike committee for this district.
