DAILY MARKET REPORT

ORRISON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE
PORTLAND, Ore., May 11.—Trend of the egg trade is decidedly softer so far as country bids are concerned. Bids general were reduced to a dozen here for Friday, although in isolated instances practically no change was shown.

General bids for current receipts or mixed lot standards were around 28c with putback at 20c. The decline was in white henneries, which were quoted down to 25c, although as high as 20c was still paid in a limited way.

It appears that the Eastern trade is holding off its purchases at the moment. This seems due to the fact that previous purchases had been made at extreme figures and as weather conditions cannot forever remain unfavorable, the season has been reached where extreme caution is necessary in the buying of eggs for long distance shipment.

BUTTER SITUATION HOLDING
Steady to strong sales are continued in the local butter trade. Cubes are in strong demand at 30c for best state offerings. Most of the central surplus is going into storage. Ice cream interests are paying 2c above top cubes for sweet churning.

CHICKEN PRICES ARE LOWER
Expectations of a general lowering of chicken prices have been realized. Slighter bids, which have held the bulk of the demand for an extended period, are today neglected. Heavy stuff is wanted.

FANCY VEAL IS SHOWING FIRM
Market for country-killed calves appears about steady at the moment. Extreme quality is scarce and sales are generally shown at 13¢13 1/2¢. An occasional selected animal brings a fraction more. Hogs steady. Lamb, 13¢20c for country-killed.

ASPARAGUS MARKET IS OFF
Despite the fact that some sales are being made as high as \$1.50 per dozen bunches, much of the trade in fancy offerings is not above \$1.25. Receipts continue to increase. Quality now at its best.

APPLE PRICES ARE HIGHER
With only a nominal supply of fair quality Yellow Newtowns available here, general prices have been advanced, with best quality quoted up to \$2.50 per box. Columbia river offerings are almost limited to note, but some supplies are being offered by Yakima and Wenatchee.
