Dancing Attendance

When a person pays marked attendance to another he is said to be "dancing attendance." This phrase comes from the Middle Ages. It was a generally observed wedding custom then that the bride must dance with all who asked her. In Christen, "State of Maryland," a book published in 1543, is found this record: "Then must the poor bride keep feet with all dancers, and refuse none, how scabbed, foul, drunken, rude and shameless soever he be."

That it was not long before the expression came to be used figuratively in the way it is used today is evidenced by Shakespeare's use of it in Henry VIII: "I had thought they had parted so much honestly among them (at least good manners) as not thus to suffer a man of his place and so near our favor, to dance attendance on their lordship's pleasure."

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
