Her work in the war won her the distinguished service medal. She has been described as the "outstanding figure in nursing education in America today."

Goodwin Home

When his parents separated when he was a child, Fred Carter was taken into the Kent, Conn. home of Rev. and Mrs. W. M. Goodwin. The Goodwins had, long before that time, adopted Jennie Barker, now a 32-year-old school teacher. The Goodwins died a few years ago, and Carter continued to live with Miss Barker, who wielded a strange influence over him, in the Goodwin home. A few weeks ago Carter, now 19, disappeared. Bloodstains were found near his home, and later a shotgun was found in the Housatonic river. A few days ago Carter's chum, Henry Gregory, shown above in a skiff, found his body in the river. He had been shot to death, but although shotmarks were found on his shirt none was found on his outer clothing. Although some were inclined to the suicide theory, no motive could be found, nor could the absence of shotmarks on his outer clothing be explained. Carter is shown here, with his graduating class, in the Kent high school.

Babe & Mrs. Ruth

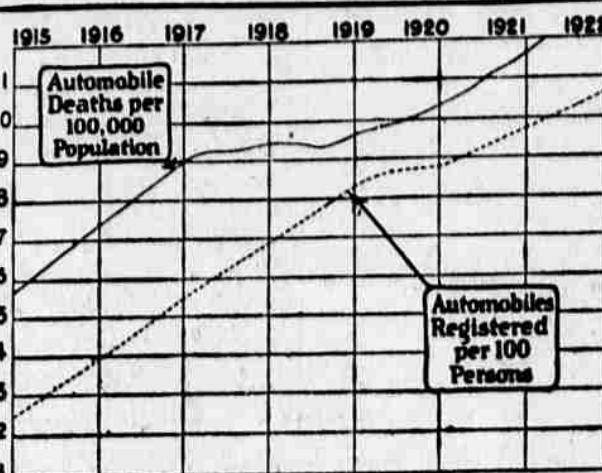
Dolores Dixon

When Dolores Dixon, a pretty New York girl, entered suit for \$50,000, alleging Babe Ruth, home-run king of the New York Yankees, was the father of her unborn child, Ruth, backed by his loyal wife, denied the charge asserting he had never even seen the girl and that he was the victim of blackmail. When the suit was about to come to trial, Ruth's attorney learned that a man who had formerly lived in an apartment where the girl had a room could bare the blackmail plot. When the attorney got an order from the court to examine the man before trial the girl hastily withdrew her suit. Ruth has placed the matter in the hands of the district attorney of New York, asking prosecution of all involved.



Martin Tabert

The death of Martin Tabert, a Munich, N. D., youth, in a Florida lumber camp, has stirred the entire nation. Tabert was arrested for stealing a ride on a train and sentenced to six months' imprisonment. His parents sent the money to pay his fine, but it was returned, and the boy leaped to a lumber company; then he became ill. He could not work as fast as the other prisoners, and he was lashed. Convicts say he died of the whipping, and Whipping Bow Higginbotham has been indicted for his murder. The legislature of North Dakota took up the case, with the result that Florida will probably abolish flogging and the leasing of prisoners to corporations.

Automobile Deaths Leap Annually
But at Less Rate Than Cars Owned

Deaths in the United States caused by motor car accidents increase annually. So does the number of automobiles registered. The above graph, however, shows that the number of deaths does not increase so rapidly as the number of cars.

Between 1915 and 1920, for instance, the number killed advanced from 2,975 to 12,500, or by 314 per cent. This figure is awesome enough in itself. The number of cars, however, increased over the same period from 2,545,664 to 10,448,662, or by 310 per cent. The number of cars in 1922 was estimated to be 11,500,000.

These statistics were charted by a large eastern life insurance company, for inclusion in its mortality tables. In commenting upon them the company says: "City governments which will continue to make their traffic regulations more and more rigid until they can point to low death rates from automobile accidents will deserve the commendation of all thoughtful people."

RUBBER AIDS BATTERIES

USE GREATLY INCREASES LIFE OF INSULATORS

Cotton Threads, First Employed by T. A. Willard, Found Better Than Inventor Expected

As with every other product in daily use and demand, engineers are continually experimenting in attempts to develop new and better features in storage batteries. Seven years ago all battery manufacturers were using wood for insulating and separating the plates of storage batteries. But the wood insulator comprised a weak link in the battery because it could not be made to last the life of the plates. Frequent and costly repairs were the common result.

Finally T. A. Willard, president of the Willard Storage Battery company, hit upon a way to vulcanize into rubber blocks thousands of cotton threads running horizontally the length of the block. The block was cut into slices so that each slice was pierced from face to face with 195,000 threads.

It was Willard's first supposition that these threads when immersed in the acid of the battery would dissolve out and leave the thousands of tiny holes he wanted. But here he failed to take into consideration the fact that acids eat and destroy only when exposed to air. The threads immersed in the acid did not dissolve out, but served as tiny wicks to conduct the electrolyte from one plate to the other, and besides helped to maintain the natural strength in the insulator, a part of which would have been lost had the threads been dissolved as he supposed they would.

The threaded rubber insulator has thus proved even more satisfactory in practice than the wild dream of its inventor.

contracted for deliveries during the remainder of the year. Cargoes of crude naphtha and gasoline have also been shipped to the Atlantic coast and Great Britain. Stocks of crude and fuel oil were increased 1,300,000 barrels. Capital expenditures approximately \$6,000,000 for the three months, and consist principally of the cost of developing the hundred wells in process of drilling. During the quarter the company purchased two new tankers with a carrying capacity of 120,000 barrels at favorable prices from the United States shipping board and made substantial expenditures for expansion of marketing facilities.

HUPP PRODUCTION LARGE

SHATTER ALL RECORDS DURING FIRST HALF OF 1923

April Shipments Exceeded Those of April, 1922, Previous High Month, by 800 Cars

Capacity operations since January of all plants under the control of the Hupp Motor Car corporation have resulted in sales of nearly as many cars for the first four months of 1923 as for the entire first six months of 1922, according to an announcement made by Charles D. Hastings, president and general manager.

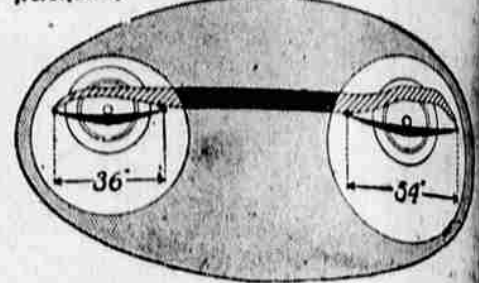
Hupp shipments for April were 4637 cars and shipments for the first four months 16,671, compared with shipments of 10,295 for the same months a year ago, an increase of 43 per cent over the record period of 1922. By the end of May more than half of Hupp's scheduled 1923 output of 40,000 cars will have been made. April shipments exceeded those of April, 1922, the record month in Hupp history up to that time, by more than 800 cars, or an increased business volume for the corporation itself of nearly \$1,000,000 over the previous high April mark.

Driveaways to many of the centers of distribution continue to be necessary, owing to the inability of railroads to supply all the freight cars needed.

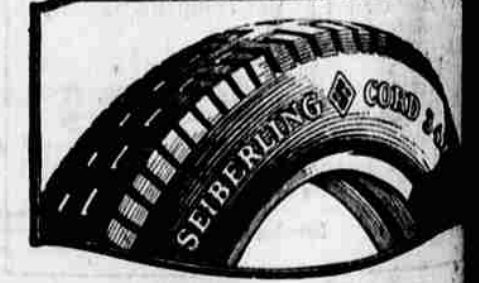

Ford Trucks and Tractors Provided for as Well as Cars by Method Recently Worked Out

GASOLINE OUTPUT GROWS

UNION OIL COMPANY SALES SHOW LARGE INCREASE

LOS ANGELES, Calif., May 13.—Showing materially increased production of crude oil and sales of the company's products and a net profit for three months of \$1,750,000, the first 1923 quarterly report of Union Oil company was issued today.

Production of crude oil by the company and controlled companies approximated 3,600,000 barrels for the 90 day period, an increase over the same period last year of 550,000 barrels.

Sales for the three months approximated \$15,000,000, an increase in value of \$1,500,000, or about 11 per cent. Reduction of the retail price of gasoline considered, however, increase in business is greater than that indicated. The company is delivering large quantities of crude oil to the Los Angeles harbor for shipment to the Atlantic seaboard and gulf points, and has
