BOWN GETS STATE PLUM

LOCAL MAN HEADS VOCATIONAL AL WORK

Harry L. Bown, former sheriff and Lane county judge, has been appointed as head of the vocational training division of the state industrial accident commission and will have his headquarters at Portland. Mr. Bown received his appointment through the efforts of Dilard A. Elkins, of this city, recently appointed by Governor Pierce as a member of the commission.

Mr. Elkins, who is here to spend the week-end, said that the appointment of Mr. Bown, whom he considers to be an efficient man for the position, will save the state about \$250 a month. The salary of \$300 a month has been cut to \$250 a month by the appointment of a stenographer at \$75 a month have been dispensed with under the new arrangement of having the vocational department in Portland instead of Salem. The majority of the men taking vocational training are in Eugene, and this is the reason for the transfer, according to Mr. Elkins.

DESERTER IS ARRESTED

SHERIFF TAKES SAM JONES AT MCKENZIE BRIDGE

Frank Jones, 24, who is alleged to have deserted from the United States army at Vancouver, B.C., was arrested at McKenzie Bridge yesterday by Sheriff Ed C. Rickels and is now in the county jail here. He will be taken back to Vancouver.

Jones, who was going under the name of Sam Williams, had worked at McKenzie Bridge last summer, being employed around the Log Cabin hotel premises and at other jobs. He enlisted in the army after leaving there last fall.

U. OF O. GETS BIG GIFT

MRS. MCCLUNG GIVES \$10,000 TIMBER CLAIM

In Memory of Ina McClung, Former Student, Scholarship in Art to Be Endowed

The gift of a timber claim valued at \$10,000 to the University of Oregon endowment fund was announced yesterday, bringing cash, gifts and pledges since fall to \$74,000, exclusive of \$37,500 already pledged by the senior class for a student union and \$70,000 for a new library which the Oregon Bar association has voted to take the leadership in raising. Thirty thousand dollars was given to the university by friends and alumni for financing the first year's campaign, which is not included in the \$74,000.

The timber claim, which has approximately nine million feet of timber, was given by Mrs. J. H. McClung of Portland, in memory of Ina McClung, a former student of the university. An Ina McClung scholarship in the art department will be endowed as a result of the gift. The timber is located in this section between the Willamette and McKenzie rivers.

Fourteen student organizations have already pledged funds for a student union, no single amount falling below \$100.

ROGER WETHERED WINS GOLF TITLE FOR BRITAIN

Young Englishman Is Victor In Finals With Harris

(By the Associated Press)

DEAL, England, May 12.—Roger Wethered, 24-year-old Englishman became the amateur golf champion of Great Britain by his victory in the final round here today over the Scotchman, Robert Harris.

Wethered captured the coveted honor by a series of brilliant matches which were termed by the veteran, J. H. Taylor, as "super-golf," but his victory today was a comparatively easy one after his task yesterday in the semi-finals of defeating Francis Quimet, the last of the invading American amateurs to survive in the tournament.

At no time today was Wethered in danger and he was able to dispose of his older opponent—Harris—by a score of seven up and six to play in their 36-hole match. The competition was unequal, the Huskies securing both firsts and seconds in many of the events.

Vic Hurley, veteran Husky track man, took the 100-yard dash in 10 flat.
