STATUARY TO BE PLACED

FAIRBANKS MAKES MODELS OF FOUR CREATIONS

Will Be Located at Different Points on Campus of University of Oregon

Award Fairbanks, assistant professor of fine arts in the University of Oregon, in charge of classes in sculpture, has completed models of four significant creations. He has prepared model for the symbolic group designed to honor all mothers and inspire youths to hold fast to the mother's ideals. When the life-size work is completed it will be placed in a central position in the women's quadrangle on the University of Oregon campus.

The second model is a soldier's memorial to be created on the University of Oregon campus in honor of university fighting men who served in the war. It will be an outstanding feature of memorial court, a future development of the university.

Professor Fairbanks recently prepared a sketch for a proposed marker for the old Oregon trail. It was prepared at the suggestion of Walter Meacham of Baker, president of the Old Oregon Trail association. The design for the marker shows a covered wagon drawn by an ox-team. A pioneer family is looking westward from their seat in the prairie schooner. The design is submitted for consideration when the Old Oregon Trail association is ready to set up highway guides.

The Oregon sculptor is modeling a service memorial for O. A. C. men who were killed during the war. The memorial is to be a bronze tablet seven feet high and 33 inches wide. It has been ordered by the O. A. C. class of 1923 as a gift to the college. The panel expresses the spirit of sacrifice personified as an angel upholding the soldier—a typical service man in his helmet, tired, boyish face uplifted, and his gun at rest in his right hand. His left hand holds the symbolical olive branch which he has won by paying the supreme sacrifice. Below the soldier's extended left arm which the angel supports is a scroll to be engraved with the names of the dead. The tablet will be completed this term and sent to New York for casting. It will be unveiled at commencement.

tenant Charles L. Webber of the air service, left San Diego at 9:15 o'clock Thursday, December 7 for a flight to Fort Huachuca, near Tucson, Arizona. Two days after the departure from San Diego five airplanes of the 12th observation squadron located at Fort Bliss, El Paso, Texas, started an intense search for the missing aviators. These planes were in charge of Major L. G. Heffernan. The planes carried emergency rations and water containers so attached that they could be dropped at any point on the desert if the lost officers were sighted and a landing was impossible.

For many weeks after the disappearance of the army officers, search for them was continued, not alone by airplanes but by searchers afoot as well. There were frequent reports that Indians had seen a wrecked airplane in Western Arizona but subsequent efforts to locate the missing craft were not successful. It was announced recently in Washington that the government had abandoned search for the missing men.

TAX ARGUMENT IS FILED

OREGON JUST TAX LEAGUE OPPOSES NEW LEVY

SALEM, Ore., May 12.—The first argument for or against the state income tax to be filed with the secretary of state for the voters' pamphlet, to be published for the referendum election on the income tax in November, was filed today by representatives of the Oregon Just Tax league. It is against the income tax act.

It claims the act favors special interests and discriminates against persons of modest means, and avers that it would work to keep new capital out of the state. The fact that no other Pacific coast state has a state income tax is emphasized.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., May 12.—Forced abolition of whipping bosses in convict camps throughout Florida was believed to be only a matter of time on the face of actions in both houses of the legislature today. The upper house of the general assembly today passed a measure placing corporal punishment under a ban for a trial period of two years, and abolishing it forever in the handling of county convicts, while the lower house after adding an amendment scratching out two years and making it read "forever" in its provisions as relating to state convicts, approved the measure by a vote of 88 to 2.

RACIAL FEELING STRONG IN INDIA SAYS TOURIST

MISS JANE ADDAMS NOTES TENSION OVER HERE

Finds that in Many Cases Prejudices Are Due to Differences in Religion

(Correspondence of the Associated Press) RANGOON, April 7.—Jane Addams, American sociologist, noted as the founder and head of Hull house, Chicago, has come to the conclusion in a six weeks' tour of British India that racial feeling is still strong and that the problem of harmonizing the various antagonistic elements is not being adequately faced at present.

When interviewed here by a representative of the Associated Press, Miss Addams said: "The question of the relation of the races is very acute in India, and has not been perfectly studied. We need to approach it with an open mind as we have studied economic and other problems. In many cases these racial prejudices are due to differences in religion. As a rule, racial antagonisms have their basis in the minds of the people, rather than in any inherent inability to live in harmony with each other. "In the larger cities," said Miss Addams, "the housing situation constitutes another difficult social problem. This is especially true of Bombay and Calcutta, where the problem has got beyond the power of the civil authorities. In this respect, however, cities are very much alike the world over. In each Indian city I have met small groups of people who are making conscientious attempts to meet the situation in order to promote a higher standard of living."

Rates Boosted on Prunes SALEM, Ore., May 12.—An increased freight rate on shipments of dried prunes from coast centers to Montana towns is announced in a bulletin of the Great Northern Railroad company received by the public service commission today. The advance is from \$1.30 1/2 a hundred to \$1.45 and is effective from the following cities: Seattle, Tacoma, Everett, Bellingham, Vancouver, Wash.; Port and San Francisco.
