DISTRICT MERGER PLAN

COLLEGE CREST AND DUNN SCHOOLS MAY JOIN

Positions Are Being Circulated Re-questioning That Question Be Submitted at Meeting

Petitions requesting that the county school board submit the question of consolidation of the Dunn and the College Crest districts to the voters of these districts are in circulation and the petitions will probably be filed this week, according to those who are interested in the proposal.

The College Crest district 181 and the Dunn district 56 adjacent to the city on the south will each hold its annual meeting June 18, in common with the other school districts of the county, and it is hoped to have the consolidation question brought up for action at that time.

Many of the residents of both districts are interested in the proposal as it is believed that with the two districts merged that a more efficient school system could be developed than under the present plan of separate districts.

Many of the children in the College Crest district at present are attending the Eugene city schools owing to the distance to the present school in the College Crest district. A consolidation of the Dunn and the College Crest districts would be a means of providing a larger district and also the building of a more centrally located school that would be to the advantage of both districts, according to those who are promoting the proposal.

The merging of school districts in order to provide one large school in place of several small ones is a move that has been advocated by county school officials for some time as a means of greater efficiency and the providing of better conditions for the children.

ROAD COST ESTIMATED

STATE ENGINEERS SEND FIGURES TO JUDGE BARNARD

Eight and Half Miles of Roosevelt Highway North of Florence Would Require \$124,000

The estimate of the state highway engineers for the cost of 8.52 miles of the Roosevelt highway from Florence north, in Lane county, is approximately \$110,000, according to figures just received by County Judge C. P. Barnard.

A movement has been started to secure the beginning of this work this year in hopes that the bureau of public roads and forest service will co-operate with the county and state on at fifty-fifty basis.

Judge Barnard said that the state and county will co-operate on this basis in building the 8.52 miles in question and if the government will match this sum he is of the opinion that the road clear through to the Lincoln county line could be completed.

Members of the county court are anxious to go ahead with this project. The government has no money set aside for it but the local officials who interviewed the government men in Portland a few days ago are very hopeful that an appropriation will be forthcoming next year.

HAD POOR PLACE TO LIVE

MRS. LEAH COBB SEEKS DIVORCE DECREE

Claiming that she was compelled to live in a house that was little better than a corn crib and alleging cruel and inhuman treatment, Mrs. Leah Cobb yesterday began action in circuit court against J. O. Cobb for divorce. They were married in Portland December 11, 1922, she says in her complaint.

Mrs. Cobb claims that her husband refuses to work or support her and that he never furnished her a suitable house to live in or things with which to cook or keep house, stating that the only stove they had was a camp stove that someone had abandoned.

It was while living at Sisters that she was compelled to live in the house that was likened to a corn crib, she says in her complaint. Mrs. Cobb asks that her maiden name, Leah Foreman, be restored to her. Walter B. Jones is her attorney.

CAR DRIVER IS ARRESTED

CALIFORNIA MAN BUMPS INTO R. M. GRAVES MACHINE

Robert Knapp, who is traveling through the state in a car with a California license, was arrested by Sheriff Stuckels yesterday for bumping into the car of R. M. Graves, a local dentist, Sunday.

Graves had been at London Springs and was on his way home and driving along the highway between Eugene and Springfield when Knapp, according to his story and that of others who witnessed the accident, driving at a very rapid rate of speed, bumped Graves' car with great force, damaging it to considerable extent.

In addition to having him arrested for reckless driving, Graves announces that he will sue Knapp for damages.
