AERIAL FOREST PATROL PLANS ARE INDEFINITE

Area Commander Writes
That Planes May Not Come

FUNDS NOT AVAILABLE

Colonel Gillmore Sends Word That
No Action Has Been Taken on
Timber Protection

Although assurance has been received from Senator McNary that the aerial forest patrol will be established here during the coming summer, a communication received by E. C. Simmons, of this city, from Colonel W. E. Gillmore, commander of the fifth corps area, indicates that no action toward the bringing of the planes here has been taken. Mr. Simmons, who has been interested in the municipal aviation field here and was instrumental in having the plan launched to purchase the flying field, recently wrote to Colonel Gillmore, asking for data on the steel hangars that were to be installed here by the aerial service. The reply from the corps area commander states that no definite move toward the establishment of the patrols here has been made.

Communication Is Received
The following is the letter from Colonel Gillmore:

I have your letter of May 3rd relative to the steel hangars for the municipal field at Eugene. As I told you, I took the matter up with the chief of air service and recommended that two steel hangars be erected on this field at Eugene, Oregon, to be used by the air service as a forest patrol base. Some time ago I took up with the chief of air service the question of whether or not forest patrol would be operated this year, and stated, in view of the reduced personnel, both officers and enlisted, and the call for air service personnel at the various training camps, that we could not operate all the activities without additional air service officers and enlisted men.

Service Is Discussed
It is my understanding that the chief of air service took up with the forestry bureau of the department of agriculture the question of forest patrol and requested, if patrol was desired, that funds be allotted by the department of agriculture for conducting the work. The department of agriculture stated they had no funds for this purpose, and that officials in Washington doubted the value of patrol. An agreement was, therefore, made between the secretary of agriculture and the secretary of war in the form of a letter, that the department of agriculture would not call on the air service this year for any forest patrol.

State Aid Is Asked
I believe that the national and state foresters, as well as the private timber interests on the west coast, think that airplane patrol is of great benefit, and we of the air service certainly believe it is of value both to the forestry bureau and to the air service personnel.

I did, some time ago, request the assistance of the state forester of Oregon in the matter of erecting two hangars at Eugene, and he informed me that the state of Oregon could do nothing in the matter. In view of the circumstances related above, no further effort has been made to erect the hangars at Eugene. I am sure that nothing will be done until the people of the coast states convince congress that it is necessary, and the department of agriculture asks, that the patrol be resumed.

Therefore, my only suggestion, is that the people interested in the project and believing that airplane patrol is of great value, do what they can to provide the means for it. With reference to the lease, it was forwarded to the Washington office, and I presume has been held there for the reasons I have given above.

RADIO RULES CHANGED

WAVE LENGTH REGULATIONS
ARE NOW IN EFFECT

Orders Issued by Navigation Service
of Department of Commerce
Are Received Here

Data on the new regulations concerning the length of radio waves of broadcasting stations in the seventh district of the Northwest have been received here. The new rulings of the navigation service of the department of commerce went into effect yesterday at noon. All class A stations are to be assigned a wave length that will cause the least interference with other broadcast listeners, according to the word sent out from the Seattle office of the federal supervisor of radio for this district.

S. T. Donohue, owner of the broadcasting station here, has made application for a new wave allocation to conform with the recent rulings. Owners of radio sets in the Northwest have the new regulations according to the local radio operator.

The following is a copy of the orders received here:
All present 350-meter stations are to be permitted to remain on a 350-meter wave length if they so desire. However, absolutely no variation from that wave length is to be permitted. That is, your station will not be permitted on a wave length of 351 meters, or a wave length of 349 meters.

If all present 350-meter stations remain on the 350-meter wave length, it is believed that the resulting interference will be greater than it has been in the past. It is for this reason that you are requested to carefully consider the advisability of applying for a class A license.

Those who apply for a class A license will be assigned wave lengths between 222 and 300 meters, as will cause the least interference at the receiving station of the broadcast listeners.
