BARS JOHNSON, FULTON

COMMISSION TAKES ACTION
AGAINST FIGHTERS

NEW YORK, May 15.—Floyd Johnston, Iowa heavyweight boxer, who was knocked out by Jess Willard last Saturday, and Fred Fulton, who lost on a foul to Jack Renault, Canadian, heavyweight, on the same bill, and their managers, Charles Cook and Jimmy Johnston, have been suspended indefinitely by the New York boxing commission, it was learned tonight. The action was taken in conjunction with the suspension of the men by the Massachusetts boxing commission for the failure of Fulton and Johnston to box before the Arena A. C. of Boston on April 16 last. The suspensions, it was said, would remain in force in New York state until the ban against the boxers and their managers has been lifted by the Massachusetts commission.

CONTEST TO BE HELD IN NEW YORK IN JULY

Rickard declined to reveal the terms for the Firpo-Willard match except that they will fight on a percentage basis.

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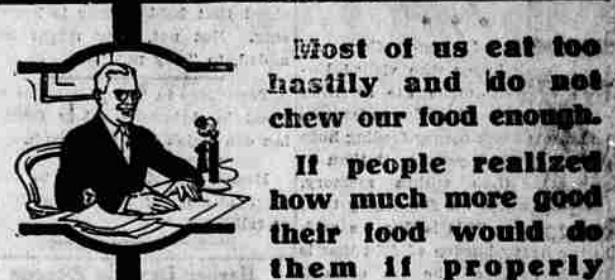
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
