## RAIL HEADS FOR MERGER

PRESIDENTS OF LINES IN EAST VOICE APPROVAL

WASHINGTON, May 16.—Two eastern railroad presidents—A. H. Smith of the New York Central and Samuel Rea of the Pennsylvania system—gave the interstate commerce commission today their qualified approval of its proposals for railroad consolidation in eastern trunk line territory. Insofar as the consolidation plans to leave the Pennsylvania and New York Central systems intact in their consolidation, reorganization, satisfaction. Mr. Rea, however, declared the Norfolk and Western, partly owned by the Pennsylvania, should be definitely grouped with his system, while Mr. Smith suggested the Central Railroad of New Jersey and parts of the Philadelphia and Reading system should be consolidated with the New York Central.

## MEXICANS ADMIT CRIME

WHOLE FAMILY HELPED KILL ITALIANS, IS CONFESSED

LAREDO, Texas, May 16.—Two Nuevo Laredo chauffeurs, arrested in connection with the killing on May 6 of six Italian immigrants at a lonely point 12 miles up the Rio Grande from here, on the Mexican side, have been convicted of conspiracy with the crime, according to Mexican officials. A Mexican and his five sons were implicated and two of the sons have confessed.
