GEARY SCHOOL IS CLOSED

SEVERAL CASES OF SCARLET FEVER AMONG PUPILS

Action Taken as Precautionary
Measure—Classes Expected
to Be Resumed May 28

The Geary school yesterday was
closed for more than a
week on account of a number of
cases of scarlet fever among the
pupils.

According to E. F. Carleton, city
superintendent, four of the pupils
have been out with the fever and
a boy living in that district who is
not in school is afflicted with the
contagion.

S. M. Kerron, city health officer,
who is ill, was unable to make per-
sonal investigation of conditions in
the school and in that part of the
city but as a precautionary mea-
sure advised that the school be
closed for a short time to await
developments. It is expected that
classes will be resumed on Mon-
day, May 28, said Superintendent
Carleton. In the meantime all the
rooms will be thoroughly fumiga-
ted.

Superintendent Carleton said
that the health officer told him
there was no cause for alarm.

CREDITOR SUES GOLDEN

TWO OTHER CASES FILED IN CIRCUIT COURT

The L. C. Clunk and Sult Manu-
facturing company yesterday sued
J. M. Golden doing business as the
Emporium seeking a judgment in
the sum of \$128.25 alleged due for
goods sold to the defendant.

The Eugene Woolen Mills com-
pany is plaintiff in a suit filed
yesterday against Joe Jacobs, seek-
ing a judgment in the sum of
\$720, with six per cent interest and
\$100 attorney fee. It is alleged that
Jacobs took 455 pounds of wool to
the mills of the plaintiff to have it
made up into robes and blankets.

It is alleged that Jacobs
took away 251 of them, leaving
231; that the charge for making the
robes and blankets was \$970
but that Jacobs has paid \$250.

C. A. Hardy appears as attorney
for the plaintiff.

The Oregon Machinery company
yesterday instituted suit against
Mac McLean, doing business as the
Eugene Auto Wrecking and Parts
company, seeking a judgment in
the sum of \$145.53 with six per
cent interest from May 14, 1923.

NEW SCHOOL DEDICATED

BUILDING AT BLACHLY DE- DICATED TO BE BEST IN STATE

The new union school building
at Blachly, dedicated Wednesday
by J. A. Churchill, state superin-
tendent of public instruction, was
pronounced by that official to be
the best rural school building in
the state, according to E. J. Moore,
county superintendent, who ac-
companied Mr. Churchill.

The building was erected at a
cost of \$12,000. It is equipped
with shower baths, furnace heat,
laboratory, and domestic science
rooms in the basement and many
conveniences in the hallways and
class rooms. The building is also
equipped with a running water
system and sewer system. The high
school which has passed all the
standard requirements is the 19th
standard high school in Lane
county.

The exercises Wednesday were
largely attended, said Superintendent
Moore. The people from all
parts of Lake creek valley gather-
ed for the program and for the
bountiful dinner served at noon.

The afternoon was devoted to
games and sports. At the forenoon
meeting Superintendent Churchill
gave an excellent address and Su-
perintendent Moore spoke. Frank
Congdon, chairman of the board of
directors made a few remarks.

Professor C. E. Barker is principal
of the high school and Ferd
Jennings and Miss Mary Sawyer are
grade teachers. Professor Barker
goes to the Junction City schools
and Mr. Jones to the Gates school
next year.

DRY REPEAL IS FOUGHT

WOMEN WILL URGE SMITH TO VETO MEASURE

NEW YORK, May 17.—A group
of women said to represent more
than 10,000,000 women voters
throughout the country who met
today to organize the national com-
mittee of 100 for the enforcement
of law, adopted a resolution urg-
ing Governor Smith to veto the
bill passed by the legislature re-
pealing the state prohibition en-
forcement act.

ed at the meeting were General
Federation of Women's Clubs,
Daughters of the American Revolu-
tion, Y. W. C. A. and the Fed-
eration of Women's Boards of
Foreign Missions of North Amer-
ica.

L. KRASSIN AND CURZON HOLD TWO-HOUR PARLEY

MEETING CONCERNS RECENT EXCHANGE OF NOTES

Whole Subject of Russo-British
Relations Reviewed in Regard
to Ultimatum to Moscow

(By the Associated Press)
LONDON, May 17.—Leonid
Krassin, Russian soviet commis-
sioner for foreign trade, had a two-
hour conference with Marquis
Curzon at the foreign office today
concerning the recent exchange
of notes by the two governments.

Both sides agreed to reveal
nothing publicly regarding the na-
ture of the discussion, and it is
apparent from the extreme secrecy
observed in the other governmen-
tal departments that Lord Curzon
is determined nothing shall be an-
nounced regarding the decisions
taken until the conversations are
concluded. The Russian trade
delegation was equally uncommu-
nicative.

It is understood, however, that
the whole subject of Russo-British
relations was reviewed in the light
of the allegations contained in
Great Britain's ultimatum to Mos-
cow. The British foreign secre-
tary extended the time limit given
in the original ultimatum to en-
able L. Krassin to communicate
with Moscow, but at the same
time, he understood, he made it
clear to Krassin that nothing
short of full compliance with all
the British demands would be ac-
ceptable.

As soon as M. Krassin has com-
municated Lord Curzon's views to
the soviet government and received
a reply he will have another con-
ference with the foreign secretary.
Optimism is expressed in official
quarters that the negotiations with
Krassin who possesses plenary
powers, will result in an amicable
solution.
