GRAVEL PLANT IS BUSY

SPRINGFIELD CRUSHER TURNS OUT ROAD MATERIAL

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., May 17.—The Springfield Sand and Gravel company, which has been operating the large gravel crushing plant on the Willamette river at the end of Main street here for the past three months, is now producing 75 to 80 yards of crushed rock, and a total of 150 yards daily of all material, according to the foreman in charge, C. H. Nestle. The capacity of the plant will probably be enlarged, it was stated, for a heavier demand for crushed rock and gravel is contemplated later on.

The plant at present is supplying material for the paving and resurfacing project between Eugene and Goshen, which is in charge of Force and Curran, contractors, of

Portland, Oregon. A great deal of material will be required for this job, and in addition, the local plant also supplies the contractors in the city, it is stated.

In addition to a complete crushing equipment, the company also owns and operates two late model dump trucks. A force of six men is now at work at the plant, and all are working full time.

Street Light on Display

High School Shop Busy

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., May 17.—Commendable progress in manual training among the classes conducted by Professor A. J. Morgan, at the high school here, has been noted by J. B. Torbett, principal. Two classes, including about 30 boys, are now engaged in the work.

Equipment contained in the two large rooms allotted to this department of the school includes a five-horse power motor, a combination machine made up of a band saw, planer and borer, 11 work benches containing vices, and several complete sets of tools. The boys also constructed a sanding machine that is doing very efficient work. A painting department is also maintained in the shop.

The students taking this training are now engaged in making book cases for the library and rearranging the shelves in this room. The playground apparatus was also built and installed by the students, and all window shades and equipment were handled by them.

Useful Articles Turned Out
Students taking specialized work at present are engaged in making cedar chests, taboretts, tables, foot stools and other articles of furniture. A complete remodeling of the library rooms adjoining is expected to be undertaken in the near future. A series of 12 tables for use in the school is also under construction at present and will be finished before the close of school, it is announced.

The value of manual training is universally recognized, says Mr. Morgan, who strongly advocates this system in the grade schools as well as the high school. Interest among the students in this work is very keen, it is stated, and many of them stay to work long after school has been dismissed.

SAILORS OUT ON STRIKE

MARY HANLON CREW WALK OFF THE VESSEL

FLORENCE, Ore., May 16.—Claiming that the captain would

pay them but 80 cents an hour while loading when the agreement among the members of the sailors' union was that their wages when loading called for \$1 per hour the sailors of the Mary Hanlon walked off the vessel just as she was ready to weigh anchor and put to sea.

The captain's story differs some in that he is reported to have said that he was paying the same wages as was being paid when they left San Francisco, but that was not satisfactory and on his own responsibility the captain had increased the pay 20 cents an hour, i. e. to 80 cents per hour, but he felt he was not justified in giving more. Captain Madsen has telegraphed to Portland for a new crew and expected them in Thursday.
