## CLUB PLANS INCREASE

MEMBERSHIP OF 450 OBJECTIVE OF GOLFERS  
Committee Discusses Preliminary Arrangements for Campaign to Start in Near Future

To launch a membership campaign for the Eugene Country Club a committee recently appointed met yesterday to draft the preliminary plans and outline the arrangements that are expected to enroll enough additional members to maintain a total of at least 150 in the organization, according to members of the committee which is composed of Elmer D. Paine, chairman; E. O. Immel, Robert W. Proctor, George Schaefer, David Auld, W. M. Dale, L. B. Sigwart and C. D. Rorer.

Under the new plan each member will purchase \$300 of stock in the new club house and grounds that are being ready by the organization for next of the bond issue of approximately \$40,000 that has been provided for the financing of the new country club plant has already been underwritten in this city by club members, according to reports of the organization officials. A second meeting of the membership committee will be held at the chamber of commerce next Tuesday evening to complete plans for the campaign. It is expected that the objective of the organization will be reached within 10 days after the work gets under way, according to the committee members.

Egan has been obtained to lay out the course and to start immediately on the drafting of the plan. Egan was architect of the Eastmoreland course at Portland and the Marshfield course.

## OLD WILL IS PROBATED

DOCUMENT MADE IN 1868 IS FILED IN PROBATE COURT

A will drawn up and signed over half a century ago was admitted to probate here yesterday. It was the will of Edward B. Bracy, who died at Mitchell, South Dakota, December 25, 1917. He left property of the estimated value of \$2500 in Lane county besides property in South Dakota. The will was drafted at Edgewood, Ohio, January 13, 1868. At the time the instrument was made out, Bracy's wife, Sarah, was named as the only beneficiary and according to the petition to probate the will, there are no other heirs now. Harold Wells was appointed by Probate Judge Barnard as administrator in Lane county and R. R. Wells, J. Harold Boylston and John L. Marsh were appointed appraisers.
