PUPILS EXAMINE MILL

PRIMARY CLASS INSTRUCTED IN FLOUR PROCESSES

(Register Lane County Special)
SPRINGFIELD, Ore., May 19.—About 40 pupils of Mrs. Lambert's primary class of the high school here, accompanied by some of their mothers, spent two hours yesterday afternoon examining the plant of the Springfield Mill and Grain Company. W. H. Stearns, head miller, and chemist of the plant, conducted the children on a tour of the entire mill, explaining in detail how flour and other grain products are made.

Following the inspection a practical demonstration of the correct method of bread making was given in the laboratory. Mr. Stearns explained the scientific method and measures used to produce the best kind of bread from the different varieties of flour.

Other work done by the association included the gathering of 53 cups, 22 saucers, 21 plates and 15 spoons for use when food is served at meetings or other affairs. Mrs. Tyson was also commended for managing the funds so that a substantial balance is on hand for the beginning of the work next year. A basket social was held in the evening, and those who attended reported that the entire affair was a success, and that there was plenty to eat for all, as well as an excellent entertainment.

The Parent-Teacher association has been very active during the past year, and has taken its place as one of the city's leading civic organizations. It is the opinion expressed by those connected with the schools here.

SCHOOL IS STANDARDIZED

NEW TRIANGLE BUILDING DEDICATED AT TIME

Pleasing Event Attended by State Superintendent Churchill Who Gives Address

BLACHLY, Ore., May 19.—The dedication and standardization of the new Triangle high school at Blachly today was without doubt the greatest event in the history of Lane county, and the construction and equipment of the building itself in so short a time, after the consolidation was formed, received unstinted praise from State Superintendent J. A. Churchill. Mr. Churchill, who was accompanied by Mrs. Charles Carter of Superintendent E. J. Moore for the dedication exercises.

Mr. Churchill, in his address, impressed upon the board of directors the great responsibility which was theirs in selecting the very best teachers available if the best results were to be obtained. He also emphasized the mighty influence the school would have in raising the standard of citizenship and its effect on the social and economic status of the community. Mr. Moore congratulated the directors and patrons on their achievement in building and equipping the school, and the teachers on the excellent work being done by them and emphasizing co-operation as being the main secret for success.

Other speakers were R. F. Congdon, chairman of the school board, and J. G. Swan, county club leader. The high school pupils under the direction of Prof. C. E. Barker conducted a very pleasing literary program consisting of several choruses and two playlets artistically rendered.

Following the exercises in the high school auditorium, a sumptuous lunch was served in the grange hall, and a ball game on the school diamond in the afternoon marked the end of what everyone declared had been a perfect day.
