TOURIST SIGN PLANNED

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE TO PUT UP CANVAS BANNER

APPEAL DIVORCE CASE MRS. OHLEN MAY TAKE SUIT TO HIGHER COURT

The written decree in the divorce case of Edith Ohlsen against Thomas L. Ohlsen, in which the plaintiff was denied a decree, was filed yesterday. It reads as follows: "That the plaintiff has failed to establish the allegations of her complaint with respect to cruel and inhuman treatment of her by

the defendant and that the defendant has established the allegations of this suit. That the defendant should be required to pay the costs of this prosecution and in addition thereto be required to pay into the court the sum of \$100 as attorney fees for the plaintiff's attorney."

The decree said nothing regarding the allegation of the defendant that another man broke up his home. Mrs. Ohlsen said yesterday that she will probably appeal the case to the supreme court.

OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE
PORTLAND, Ore., May 22.—No change in the egg market situation was shown here for the day. Tuesday's bids were generally the same as those that ruled Saturday and Monday, and selling prices were likewise unchanged.

Occasional spurts of bullishness are shown here as a result of the somewhat steadier tendency of the Eastern trade. It appears that the previous weakness was of a manipulative order, with the big operators there telling in advance what the market was going to do and what they expected to pay on the coast.

BUTTER SITUATION HELD SAME
Market for butter is showing a confirmation of the previous strong tone. Cubes remain at 39¢ for the better quality offerings, with a quick clearing of supplies despite the greatest output known in the trade.

CHEESE MARKET LOOKS HIGHER
Because of further advances in the Wisconsin market, according to a message received by A. H. Morris Co., the trade here is anticipating a general rise for Tillamook offerings soon. At the present time Tillamook is unwilling to allow anyone to purchase liberally.

STRAWBERRY SUPPLIES GAIN
Increasing supplies of strawberries are shown here with the Willamette valley and Southern Oregon contributing most of the fruit. One lot is coming from Hood River and White Salmon, with sales of Clarkes at \$4.00 to \$5.00. Local stock selling at \$4.00 to \$5.00. On the Farmers' market at \$3.50 to \$4.25 generally, with the bulk of the best at \$3.75.

ASPARAGUS PRICES ARE HIGHER
Further general advance of 25¢ is showing for asparagus here, with best local stock at \$2.00 to \$2.25 per dozen bunches, with Walla Walla pyramids at \$2 generally. Offerings on the Farmers' market went at \$1.75 per dozen bunches.
