EUGENE PEOPLE THANKED

DIRECTOR OF NEAR EAST RELIEF IS APPRECIATIVE

Lane County Sends Ton of Clothing for Destitute Armenians and Others

The people of Eugene have been thanked by John J. Handaker, state director of the near east relief, for their generous contributions of clothing to be sent to the destitute people in Armenia and other countries in that section. J. R. Getchell, who had charge of collecting the clothing here, yesterday received the following letter from Mr. Handaker: "I wish that you might step

into the Portland auditorium and see the tons and tons of clothing coming in from all over the state for the relief of the near east sufferers. The ton and more from Lane county will help swell the grand total.

"Please accept my grateful appreciation for what you have done and extend that appreciation to the press and the individuals and organizations which helped you.

"During the coming winter I trust that those who have gladly contributed this clothing may see in their imagination little children and the adults of the near east who have been clothed by their gifts. The children are just as attractive, lovable and promising as our own. The adults are people who have recently been driven from home, many of them being professional and business men and their families. The clothing which represents your gifts will mean to the refugees that somebody cares and will give them courage to start up again in some country where they may have a chance for life and success.

"I trust the consciousness that you have thus reached a helping hand to those in such desperate situation in the near east will be reward to you and your helpers for the service you have gladly rendered."

EDITOR PIPER IS COMING

NOTED JOURNALIST OF PORTLAND SPEAKS AT ASSEMBLY

A gathering that the University of Oregon assembly committee believes will be of interest to townspeople as well as students is scheduled for tomorrow at 11 a. m. in Villard hall when Edgar B. Piper, editor of the Portland Oregonian, is scheduled to speak on "Success."

Mr. Piper has many friends in Eugene and is known to students and faculty. He is a regular attendant at the annual newspaper conferences, held on the campus under the auspices of the school of journalism, and has addressed the university student body on former occasions.

The Portland editor has a reputation as a speaker not only among his fellows in Oregon, but outside of the state as well. He represents all American editors on their mission abroad during the war, speaking at a banquet in their honor in London. The leading British journalists and many officials of the government were present.

John Piper, a son of the Portland editor, is a student in the school of journalism at the university.

LUMBER IS ORDERED

COMMISSIONER RONEY MAKES TRIP TO FERGUSON CREEK

Lumber for the Cheshire extension of the territorial road now under contract was ordered by L. N. Roney, county commissioner, yesterday. The commissioner went up Ferguson creek west of Junction City and contracted with a small mill near the highway to deliver necessary lumber for small bridges and made a trip up Bear creek.

The day before both commissioners made a trip to the Lake creek road and back by the old stage road. They have decided to route traffic over the latter while the Blachly-Bainbrook section of the state highway along Lake creek is being built this summer. They instructed the patrolmen in the different districts to level the road up and the opinion was expressed that it will be in fairly good shape for auto travel this summer, although it is pretty rough now, said the commissioners.
