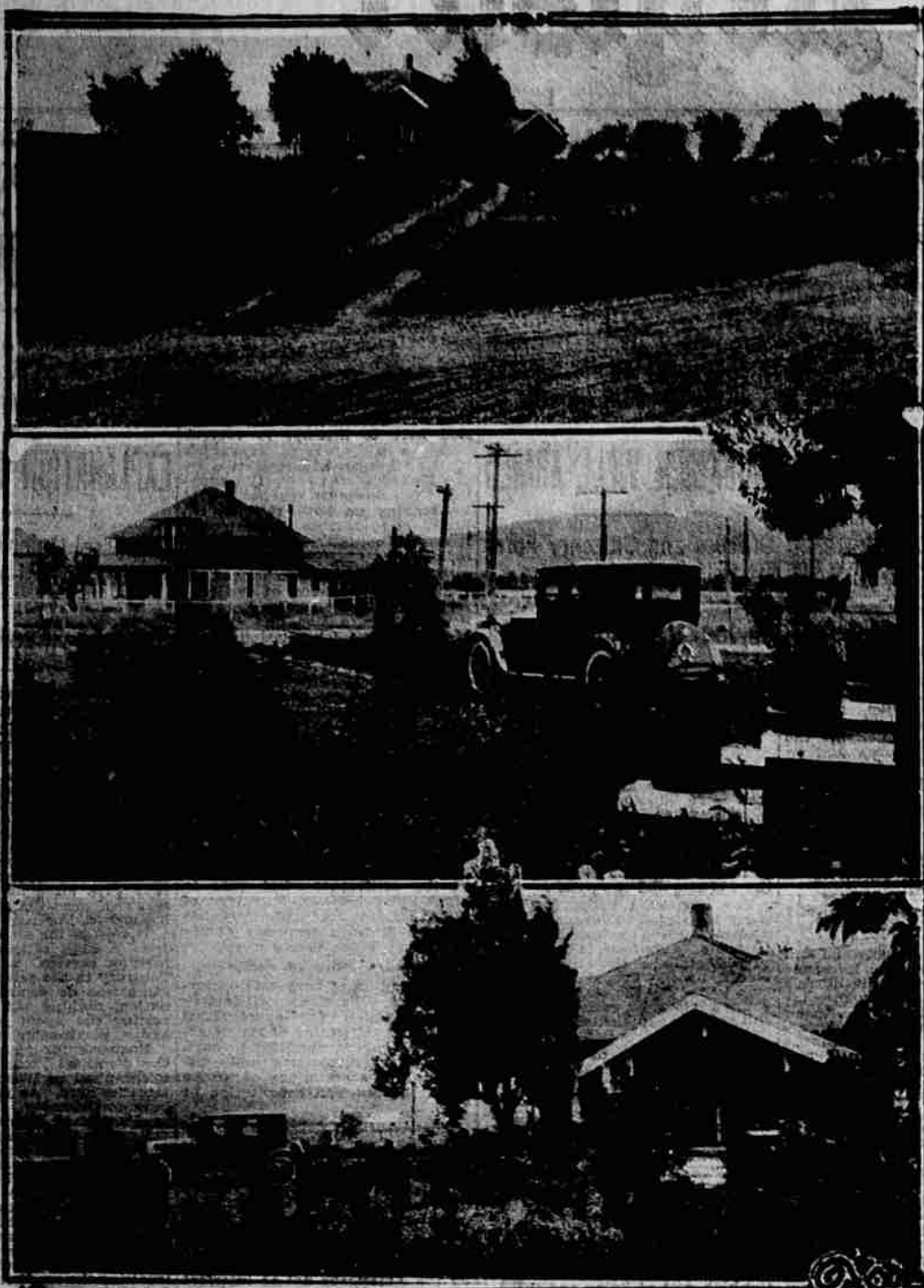




Three views showing some of the attractions of the new addition to Eugene.
