TRAFFIC LAW VIOLATORS APPEAR—BOYS REPRIMANDED

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., May 28.—Three persons were fined for speeding during the past week, and one driver was cited for parking too near a city fire hydrant. MONUMENT TO VETERANS TO BE PRESENTED MAY 30

Ceremonies Will Be Event at Cemetery, on Mill Race and at Second and Main Street

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., May 28.—The Springfield G. A. R. will conduct the services commemorating memorial day here and will unveil a handsome monument presented by the ladies of the order at Laurel Hill cemetery. The Odd Fellows of this city will at the same time present the G. A. R. with a plot of ground on which to place the stone. A bronze spread-eagle crowns the marble

which is to be dedicated to the memory of the old soldiers. A memorial day procession will leave the Woodman hall Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock and the opening services at the cemetery will be conducted by Rev. A. G. Sater. C. M. Dority will deliver the ritual services and place the flowers on the graves and M. G. Brewster will be the speaker of the day.

A water ceremony will be held in the afternoon at 2 o'clock and flowers will be strewn on the mill race from the mill race bridge. The Civil war veterans and members of the American Legion will meet at Second and Main street and march to the scene of the ceremony at the water, after which the concluding exercises will be held at Second and Main street. DAILY MARKET REPORT

OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE

PORTLAND, Ore., May 28.—Market for butter is by no means inclined to follow the recent advance in the price of prints. While the Monday morning trade here was of most nominal character, due to unwillingness of buyers to take hold until they had a line on what the South was doing, there was an undertone of uncertainty in the butter trade generally.

For prints a well-maintained situation is showing generally in this territory. Due to the extreme prices being paid for butter, creamery interests are compelled to secure full prices for their offerings or take a loss.

EGG TRADE IS JUST HOLDING
Market for eggs is slow in spots, but generally speaking indicates a steady tone. Prices are unchanged for both buying and selling. A slight improvement in the San Francisco market was an aid.

SPRAWLERY PRICES ERRATIC
Changing values are shown in the market for strawberries with the farmers' market on the east side generally the high point. Sales there were made Monday morning at \$2.00 to \$3.00 per crate, with the bulk of the best berries at \$2.50 to \$2.75. On Friday street sales were made at \$2.00 to \$2.75, according to quality. Most of the cartons of Kennewick stock was carried over from Saturday. Berries were small but of good quality.

ASPARAGUS PRICES ARE HIGH
Higher prices were forced for asparagus, with a scarcity of offerings for the week's opening. On Front street local stock sold generally at \$2 per dozen bunches, with Walla Walla pyramids at \$2.00 to \$2.25.

PANTRY LETTUCE IS HOLDING
While the market is overstocked with poor to ordinary quality local head lettuce, fancy stuff held rather well on the farmers' market at \$1.75 to \$2.00 per crate with Front street sales around \$2.00 to \$2.25.

LOCAL ONIONS SELLING BEST
While only nominal stocks remain, there is a better call for old crop Oregon onions than for new crop California stock. Of the latter the whites are moving best, but red stock is rather slow, although of good quality for initial offerings. Prices unchanged.
