

NEW FREIGHT TARIFF IS ISSUED BY S. P. COMPANY

Specific Rates Named to Different Points on Line
 ME REDUCTION MADE
 Stations Are Helped at Larger Stations to Handle Their Business

Mr. Sparks, district freight agent of the Southern Pacific company, is in receipt of new local rates effective July 1, which show specific class rates between Eugene and points on the Southern Pacific main line north to Albany, and west to Roseburg, and also rates between Eugene and Corvallis, Springfield and Corvallis. The new tariff is a distinct decrease from the past, in that it shows specific rates to each point. The policy of publishing rates in this manner is expected by rail merchants as it will save

them considerable work and annoyance. At present the shippers must call up the district or local office of the company, or figure out the mileage between Eugene and the point to which they desire to ship, then turn to the distance table of rates in order to find what they must pay. This takes time, and a slight error in figuring rates results in determining rates either too high or too low, thus affecting prices which the Eugene merchants must make against their competitors.

Reductions Authorized
 An inspection of the tariff, however, shows that this is not all Eugene shippers will be thankful for, because from the numerous signs appearing opposite the various stations it will be observed that many reductions from present rates are authorized. This is particularly noticeable in the rates at points on the Coos Bay branch, where reductions appear at all points west of Elsie, and a check shows that Eugene has been given the same rates to and from Marshfield as apply between Portland and Eugene; in other words, Eugene under the new rates may ship through Marshfield or Portland at equal rates, so far as the rail line is concerned.

Shippers Helped
 Mr. Sparks said that the new tariff is the result of efforts that are being made by the Southern Pacific to help shippers at the larger stations in Oregon to handle

their business. It is along the lines of tariff simplification and is also a recognition of the growing business of Eugene merchants.

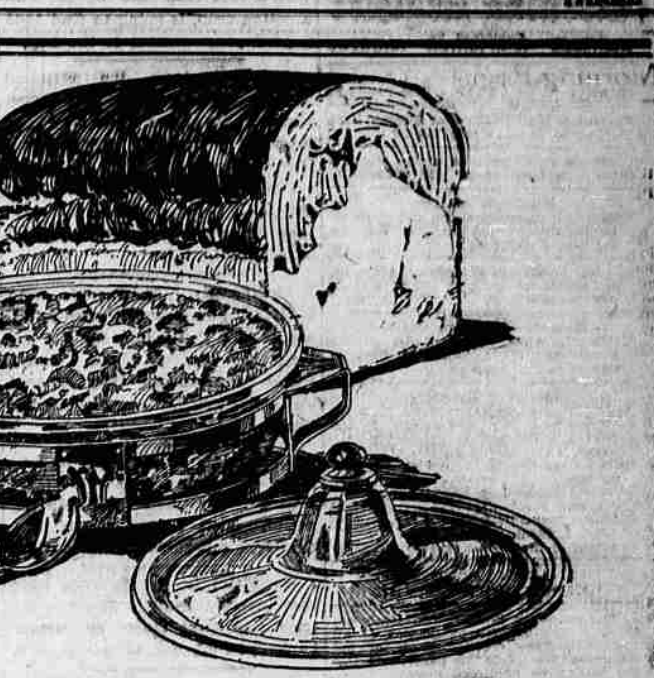
IMPROVEMENTS IN SYSTEM PROPOSED BY COUNCIL

Question of Supplying Money for Rebuilding Certain Lines to Be Voted Upon

The people of Eugene will have an opportunity at the next election to vote upon the issuance of more sewer bonds for the purpose of financing a needed improvement in at least two sections of the city where the system is entirely inadequate to take care of the sewage. The city council at its meeting last night voted to instruct the city engineer to prepare data on the improvements so as to ascertain the amount of bonds to be voted upon.

The question came up for discussion when Elmer Busell, residing in the eastern part of the city, asked the council, to give relief to the people living in his section from conditions that have existed for a long time. He said that eight-inch sewers empty into one of the main dimensions and as a result there is an overflow whenever there is a heavy rain and conditions are very unsanitary.

Councilman S. R. Mosher said he saw the need of improvement in the sewers in that portion of the city and pointed to the fact that a similar condition exists in a certain part of the west end. He moved that the question of issuing more bonds be taken up and the motion was unanimously carried. This action was taken after it was ascertained that there is but little money in the permanent sewer fund.

 1 tablespoon grated onion

 1 cup finely minced celery
 1/2 teaspoon paprika

Drain liquid from pint can of tomatoes. Butter baking dish—cover bottom with half of the tomatoes. Over this sprinkle half of the following: salt, sugar, paprika, onion, cheese and celery. Then add half the bread crumbs and half the butter. Add remaining layer of tomatoes and other ingredients. Cover dish with remaining half of the bread crumbs and the butter. Bake twenty minutes in a hot oven. (One-half cup chopped nuts may be added to make this a meat substitute.)
