Wages Discussed at Meeting of Lumbermen—D. W. Crites Gives Report of Portland Trip

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., May 29.—The matter of financing the Springfield baseball club was brought up at a joint meeting of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen and the business men of this city last night. The sentiment expressed was that Springfield should have a well-supported team, and that to have this team one of the best in the league should be a matter of civic pride. A committee consisting of Earnest Skinner, Ralph Martin and D. W. McKinnon was appointed to investigate the financial end of the sport, and will report on their findings at the next meeting of the legion.

Wages were also discussed at this time, although no definite action was taken, nor any general sentiment expressed as to the present scale.

D. W. Crites, who attended the district meeting of the L. L. L. in Portland last week, also made his report at this time, and told of the work of the Portland gathering. He emphasized the rapid growth of the order, and told how conditions in many camps have been bettered and wages raised as a result of the four L. activity. He also cited the fact that few camps or mills where the legion was in-

stalled were troubled during the recent L. W. W. strike. Co-operation among members and among the units at camps and mills was stressed as very essential to a successful functioning of the order. And Mr. Crites pointed to the success that the organization has had in the Northwest as evidence of this working together.
