CASWELL WITH LUDFORD

HALF INTEREST IN PAINT AND
ART STORE BOUGHT
Former Englund Re-Enters Business in this City After Absence of Two Years

O. C. Caswell, for many years a resident of this city, but who recently has been living in California and Portland for two years, has bought a half interest in Fred Ludford's paint and art store in this city and will hereafter be associated with him in the business. A firm name has not yet been chosen, said Mr. Caswell yesterday.

Mr. Caswell is known here as one of the organizers of the Cash and Carry store of this city, being at that time a member of the firm of Caswell and Whitten, who sold out to A. E. Gray. They established the store in 1912 in the building now occupied by the store in which Mr. Caswell has acquired an interest.

Mr. Ludford said yesterday that he and his family left two years ago with an idea of seeking a location which they would possibly like better than Eugene but have finally come to the conclusion that none of the places they visited could compare with the old home town as a good place in which to live and as to opportunity for business.

Mr. Ludford has been in the paint business here for 18 years and a few years ago added a line of art goods. Wholesalers from whom he buys his goods have stated that he does a bigger business than any other in this line of goods in the state outside of Portland.

It is the intention to enlarge the stock, said Mr. Caswell, and make quite a number of improvements besides adding a number of other lines.

Mr. Ludford has done a small jobbing business during the past year or two and it is planned by the partners to add to this department and reach out into additional territory.

ARMY TO RECRUIT HERE

STATION TO BE OPENED AT EUGENE ARMORY

Sergeant John Fisher Arrives Here from Salem Headquarters to Enlist for Service in East

Recruiting for the United States army is to start in Eugene with the arrival here of Sergeant John Fisher who has been stationed at the army recruiting office at Salem. It is probable that a recruiting headquarters will be established here at the armory, and that Sergeant Fisher, and recruits will be received for the next week, according to the present schedule announced.

Enlistments have been authorized for service on the eastern coast. Authority has been granted to enlist men for station in the following named states: Maine, New Hampshire, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, New York, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, District of Columbia, Panama canal and Hawaii.

Men enlisted under this authority will be sent to Fort McDowell, San Francisco, California, and will go from there through the Panama canal by transport to points on the east coast. This is an exceptional opportunity for young Americans who desire to see the world at the expense of the government. Men between the ages of 18 and 35 who are physically fit are eligible for enlistment.

JULY 4 PARADE TALKED

LEGION AND CHAMBER RECEIVE SUGGESTIONS

Suggestions for the features of the Big July 4 celebration to be staged in Eugene by the Lane county post of the American Legion in co-operation with the chamber of commerce are being received by the members of the committee in charge of the event, according to Lynn S. McReady, commander of the legion post. A parade is to be one of the popular presentations, according to many. Decorated motor cars and floats entered by industrial establishments and business houses is to be one phase of the celebration to be taken up by the committee, according to Mr. McReady.

It has been proposed to offer a prize for the best float entered by the various Lane county communities. A street dance and mardi gras carnival are also being considered as celebration events.

GROUND DRAINS DESIRED

JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT DISCUSSED

Installation of tiles for the draining of the grounds of the Junior high school was a matter of discussion at a special meeting of the Parent-Teacher association of the school yesterday. It has been decided to have the J. H. A. president, Mrs. C. A. Sutherland, present the matter to the school board at the next meeting of that body in order to ascertain if there are sufficient funds for the proposed work. Officials of the Junior High P. T. A. report that the grounds are in need of some system of drainage to clear the surplus water that collects after every rain.

The P. T. A. also voted to contribute \$10 toward the maintenance of the two summer playgrounds to be opened here in July and August at the Patterson and Lincoln schools.

MOOSE LODGE IS HOST

OLD AND NEW MEMBERS GATHER FOR PARTY

Local L. O. O. M. also Makes Plans for Celebration of Anniversary of Organization of Lodge Here

Members of the Moose lodge and ladies of the Mooseheart Legion were joint host last evening at a "get acquainted party" held at the Moose hall for the purpose of providing an opportunity for the new members to meet the old. About 150 members of the order were present for the event, which included a program of music and entertainment and refreshments. Members of the junior order of Moose were also present. This unit recently organized now has about 50 members and expectations are that in the near future the charter presentation ceremonies will be held.

The twelfth anniversary of the organization of the Eugene unit of the L. O. O. M. is to be celebrated with a big class initiation Friday evening, June 29. In order to have a large class of candidates a special dispensation has been received by the local Moose lodge to admit members on a reduced fee during the next month. This birthday celebration and initiation is expected to be one of the big events of Eugene Moosehood during the present year, according to officials of the order in charge of the preparations.

A program of wrestling and boxing in addition to stunts and songs and music to be followed by a banquet is the promise of the L. O. O. M. officers for the show.

MEDIC UNIT INSPECTED

COLONEL BRECHEMIN HERE TO LOOK OVER GUARD

United States Army Supervisor Reports That Eugene Detachment Is Displaying Efficiency

Colonel L. Brechemin, United States army medical officer in charge of the instruction of the national guard units of Oregon, Washington and Montana, was in Eugene last evening to inspect the medical unit of the 186th Infantry in command of Captain Orville Waller. Colonel Brechemin was here several months ago at the time he received federal recognition. This is the second inspection visit and the colonel expressed his satisfaction at the efficiency of the Eugene detachment.

The colonel is also inspecting the three other medical units of the state at Albany, Portland and Lebanon. The Lebanon medical unit of the 182nd Infantry is under the command of Captain W. H. Dale, of Eugene.

The annual camp of the national guard troops of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana is to be held at Camp Lewis June 16 to 30. It will be the largest gathering of national guard units on the Pacific coast since the war, according to Colonel Brechemin. The entire 41st division will be encamped and about 6000 men will take part in the training, is the enthusiastic report of the visiting officer. The governors of Oregon, Washington and Idaho will be present one day of the camp when a review of the troops will be held in their honor, according to the plans being made, the colonel stated.

GRAVES ARE DECORATED

EUGENE HONORS ITS SOLDIER AND SAILOR DEAD

Parade Will Be Held This Forenoon as Start of Annual Observance of Memorial Day

Eugene will pay its annual tribute to its military and naval dead and preparations have been completed for the massing of blooms on the graves of the departed who have served the nation in its armed forces. The observance of the memorial will start this forenoon with a parade in which will take part the various organizations of veterans of the city and patriotic societies and fraternal organizations. The parade will start from the armory at 9:30 and will traverse a route through the business district and then to the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Memorial services will be held at the G. A. R. plot at the cemetery and also at the plot of the United Spanish War Veterans. The marchers on the return to the armory will be served luncheon by the members of the Ladies of the G. A. R. The services for the sailor dead will be held at 3 p. m. A parade from the armory will precede the services. In one year the services have been held on Ninth avenue span but it was believed better to have the ceremony at the Eighth avenue bridge on account of danger if a large crowd gathered on the Ninth avenue span.

TEN PERSONS INDICTED BY LANE GRAND JURY

Three Are Chinese on Opium Charges

CHIN BING PLEADS GUILTY

Local Hotel Cook Admits Possession of Drug and Will Be Sentenced Saturday

Indictments against ten persons now in custody were returned by the Lane county grand jury yesterday. It was expected that the work of the jury would be completed yesterday afternoon and a final report made, but it was decided to hold it over until Thursday, today being a holiday.

Three of those indicted are Chinese accused of unlawful possession of opium. Chin Bing, one of those indicted, afterward entered a plea of guilty and will be sentenced Saturday morning, according to announcement of Judge Skipworth. The others indicted on this charge are Charley Young and Chin Sing, who were arrested Monday by deputy sheriffs when they raided the rooms above the Chinese store on Sixth avenue east and, entering down a door found the occupants smoking opium. Young is still in jail but Chin Sing's employer bailed him out. He is also a hotel cook.

Chin Bing was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Rodney Roach and Police Officer C. A. Cornell in an alley back of the armory on the night of May 13 as he was in the act of selling opium to a local addict. He afterward gave \$2500 bail.

Woman Is Indicted

Others indicted were Frances Babb, Robert W. Travers and W. M. Thomas, charged with obtaining money under false pretenses in passing bad checks; Willard Carpenter and Dale Johnson, charged with crimes against nature; Al Neil, accused of operating a moonshine still; and Nick Boyd, accused of unlawful possession of moonshine mash.

Frances Babb and Travers were arrested April 28 after the woman had given a worthless check for \$25.00 in payment for a gold watch bought at the Lucky jewelry store. They had motored all the way from Kansas City, Mo., to Eugene, and, according to information received by Sheriff Stickels, had left a long string of bad checks throughout California. Both are now in jail.

W. M. Thomas was arrested at Junction City May 7 by Deputy Sheriff Frank Nettleship after he had tried to pass two worthless checks at different stores.

Nick Boyd, a Russian, was arrested on his place north of the city near Santa Clara May 2 with a mash on his place. He is out on bond, a fellow countryman from Washington having put up cash to obtain his release.

Moonshiner Is Let

Al Neil is the man arrested by Deputies Rodney Roach, Van Svarverud and Earl Humphrey near Lorane a few days ago, having been caught in the act of making moonshine.

Willard Carpenter, accused by a nine-year-old boy, was arrested a short time ago in company with the boy in the jungles across the river, and Dale Johnson was arrested April 30. He is charged with a disgusting offense.

All of those indicted were arraigned before Judge Skipworth yesterday afternoon and each except Chin Bing took a day to plead.
